## COUNCILMEN WILL GO TO PORTLAND

And Examine Different Kinds of  
Pavement in Use There - Meet-  
ing Held Last Night - T. G.  
Hendricks Gives \$500 to Buy  
New Books for Carnegie Library

The city council held an adjourned meeting last night for the purpose of further discussing the paving question and the final outcome was an agreement that the members should make a trip to Portland in the near future to examine the pavements in use there. They will likely go about February 6.

A letter from Mayor Lane, of Portland, was read, showing the cost of different pavements in that city as follows:

Macadam, \$2.50; gravel, \$2.25; asphalt, \$2; bituminous, including tile drains, \$2.05; stone blocks, \$3.05; wooden blocks on concrete, \$2.50; grading, 35 cents per cubic yard. Plans and specifications for street grading in Portland accompanied the letter. A letter from the city engineer of Seattle stated that four kinds of pavement are used there, namely, stone blocks, vitrified brick, treated wood and asphalt.

#### Donation for Library.

Councilman Bristow reported that T. G. Hendricks, president of the First National Bank, had donated the sum of \$500 for the purchase of new books for the public library. The gift was accepted and a vote of thanks tendered.

#### The New Ordinance.

Mayor Wilkins, during the discussion of the new ordinance regulating cigar stores and "soft drink" places, stated his reason for not signing the ordinance. He said that some of its provisions were unreasonable; for instance, if the officers undertook to enforce it literally they could enter a man's private residence and arrest him if liquor was found therein. Councilman Calkins, leader of the prohibition faction, declared that the ordinance had no such provision and stated that objections should have been made before its passage, as it was up before the council several times before it became a law.

**New Member Library Board**  
County Judge G. R. Chrisman was appointed a member of the city library board, and his appointment was approved by the council.

### LEANDER DILLON BURNED TO DEATH

Prineville, Or., Jan. 27.—Leander Dillon was burned to death at 3 o'clock this morning. He slept in a covered wagon box and last night went to bed in an intoxicated condition. It is supposed that some matches in his pocket ignited the bedding in the wagon.

The fire blazed slightly for a few minutes, first suffocating him and then burning him to a crisp.

Dillon was a pioneer of Crook county and was 65 years of age. He left a widow and a large family.

## GREAT DAMAGE BY "SILVER THAW" IN PORTLAND

Telephone, Telegraph and Electric Systems Demoralized - Telephone Company Alone Lost One Hundred Thousand Dollars Loss. Barbed Wired.

Portland, Jan. 29.—Rain that became ice almost the instant it fell yesterday caused financial loss in Portland and vicinity amounting to several hundred thousand dollars and demoralized electrical power and street railway service. It was brought about by a peculiar meteorological condition known as a "silver thaw." The Pacific States Telephone and Telegraph Company alone, it is stated, suffered a loss of \$100,000 in Portland, and all the electric companies lost heavily.

The storm area extended over the lower half of the Willamette valley, north to the sound country, and west to the coast line. In parts of this district, however, there was no freeze the temperature remaining above the freezing point. The greater part of the damage is believed to have been suffered in Portland and vicinity.

The "silver thaw" began shortly after midnight yesterday morning. Sleet first began to fall, which later changed to rain. As soon as the rain was precipitated upon the streets, roofs and the electric wires it froze and as the rain continued ice accumulated rapidly.

The sum total of the "silver thaw" of yesterday was as follows:

Street railway system demoralized, cars on all lines running across the Burnside, Steel and Morrison street bridges being stopped. Service on West Side almost at a standstill.

Miles of telephone and telegraph wires prostrated. Nearly 10,000 telephones of the Pacific States Telephone and Telegraph Company out of order.

Fire alarm telegraph system out of order.

No electric lights on East Side last night, and no are and street electric lights on the West Side.

Many of the public schools closed. Every orchard in Portland and vicinity damaged.

Thousands of shade trees in Portland damaged, hundreds of them to such an extent that they will have to be cut down. Some of them torn out by their roots. Great havoc of trees at City Park.

Business in Portland almost stationary, and stores close early.

### "SILVER THAW" HAS BEGUN TO DISAPPEAR

Guard Special Service.

Portland, Or., Jan. 29.—The "silver thaw" which wrapped Portland in ice late on Sunday night, commenced to disappear today under the influence of warmer weather.

Great financial loss was caused by the phenomenon. The telephone company alone has lost \$100,000, and all companies using overhead wires have lost heavily. It is expected the total loss will reach \$200,000.

Many horses were killed by live wires, but no human life was lost. Trees and telegraph and telephone poles are down in every direction. Foliage in many places is ruined and it is expected that fruit trees within 50 miles of Portland sustained great damage.

Hundreds of miles of wires are lying in the streets, and last night many sections of the city were without light or power.

### RUSSIAN FISHERMEN AFLOAT ON GULF

Riga, Jan. 29.—Fourteen fishermen are adrift on ice floes in the gulf of Riga. The men were fishing when the ice broke suddenly and they found themselves being blown out to sea by a strong wind. Steamers are searching for the fishermen.

CHANGES IN FOOTBALL RULES

Joint Committee Modifies Game in Light of Experience.

New York, Jan. 28.—Some important changes in the rules governing football were decided upon Saturday at a meeting of the new joint rules committee. The conditions will come before the joint committee for final disposition probably in March. Among the rules is the lengthening of the halves from 30 to 35 minutes each. The new rules in reference to the pass provide, instead of a penalty of the loss of the ball on an unsuccessful pass, a 15-yard penalty on the first and second downs. When a foul is committed, it counts as a down. The proposed substitute for the present forward pass is as follows:

"If a forward pass, before reaching the ground, or a kicked ball either before or after reaching the ground, goes out of bounds, the ball shall belong to the opponents at the point where it crosses the side line."

Another important change is the creation of a new field official, the field umpire. The new game, it was stated today, often made it difficult for the referee and umpire to settle contested plays, so the new official was created to be on the field in the defending territory and close to the scene of the play.

Rule 19 of last year was changed so that on a kick-out after a touch-back or a safety, the opponents may not come within ten yards of the side having a free kick.

In the present on-side rule a provision was inserted that a line player is permitted to carry the ball, provided he does not leave his position in the line until the ball has been put into play. It was also decided that a player may at all times pass the ball to another player of his own side, who is behind him.

A new section of rule 5 states that the player shall be considered as having opportunity to make a fair catch if he is in such a position that it would be possible for him to reach the ball before it touches the ground. To the same rule was added:

"In case a signal for a fair catch is made by any player who has an opportunity for a fair catch, and another player of his side who has not signalled for a fair catch catches the ball no run shall be made and a fair catch shall not be allowed, but the ball shall be given to the catcher's side for a down, at the point where the catch was made."
