MUST SELL

LAND OF GOOS BAY BOGS GRANTS

Waterbury Introduces Bill That May Throw Valuable Oregon Land On Market Cheap - Appropriation For Jamestown Exhibit Is Killed. Routine Matters in Legislature

Salem, Or., Jan. 30.—Waterbury introduced a bill this morning to compel the sale of vast tracts of land in Coos county, now held by a syndicate, at \$2.50 an acre. The government granted the tract to the state for the construction of a military road between Roseburg and Coos Bay, in 1868, providing that not more than a quarter section could be sold to any one, the price to be \$2.50 an acre. The intention was to fill the country with settlers. This land will be transferred if the present owners refuse to sell at the price stipulated in the grant because it is too valuable. If the bill passes it will throw open a great and rich country at a small price per acre.

No Jamestown Exhibit.

Opponents of the Jamestown exposition appropriation bill succeeded in defeating the measure in the senate this morning. They headed off future discussion by moving to have it indefinitely postponed. Ray and Johnson led the fight for retrenchment, declaring the start for curtailing large appropriations must begin somewhere, and a good place to commence was at Jamestown, the least benefit to the state.

Beach, chairman of the federal relations committee, reported the bill appropriating \$65,000 favorably.

Johnson submitted a minority report, contending that there was a heavy call for internal improvements

INDIAN APPROPRIATION BILL IS SUBMITTED

Washington, Jan. 30.—It is estimated that the Indian appropriation bill carries more general legislation of a far more reaching effect than it has in many years. It contains practically all the recommendations of the special sub-committee of the senate which visited Oklahoma and Indian territory during the summer investigating citizenship and property rights of the five civilized tribes. Chief of the recommendations is that "on and after July 1, 1907, all restrictions upon the leasing or en-

cumbering of the lands, except homesteads, of all allottees of Indian blood in the Indian territory, and all restrictions upon the alienation, leasing or encumbering of all the lands of allottees not of Indian blood are hereby removed.

An equally extensive provision has been adopted in relation to coal and asphalt lands. The surface of the segregated land of the Choctaw and Chickasaw nations, containing the deposits, whether leased or unleased, is to be appraised by an appraiser to be appointed by the secretary of the interior and approved by the president, and their value ascertained. When this has been done the surface of these lands may be sold, after six months' notice of such sale, in tracts of not more than 160 acres to each purchaser, and at not less than the appraised value. The sales are to be made subject to the right of the purchaser of mineral deposits to mine under the lands, in accordance with conditions drafted by the special committee which investigated the subject, whose report already has been published.

The Blackfeet reservation in Montana is to be opened to settlement if another senate amendment is adopted. Provision is made for the immediate survey of all the lands embraced within the limits of the reservation and for allotment to all persons having tribal rights on the reservation. The remainder of the lands are to be appraised in the usual manner and opened to settlement in accordance with the general custom of throwing Indian lands open to the public. An appropriation is made also to enable the secretary of the interior to complete the survey, allotment, classification and appraisal of the lands in the Flathead Indian reservation in Montana.

BECOMES SENATOR JUST TO FILL IN

Washington, Jan. 30.—The oath of office was administered in the senate today to Senator F. M. Mulkey, of Oregon. He will hold office until Senator-elect Lorne's term begins on March 4th.

The credentials of Jonathan Boyce, Jr., elected senator from Oregon, have been received by the senate and placed on file.

John M. Garin, whose term as senator has expired, has started on his return home.

JAVA ISLAND REVOLT EASILY SUPPRESSED

Amsterdam, Jan. 30.—A brief encounter with the troops sent to the scene of the native uprising on the island of Java sufficed to suppress the rebels, whose ringleader and fifteen of his followers were killed and many wounded.

EXPLOSION

WRECKED MINE KILLED MANY

Ninety-One Men Were Working at Time of Explosion and There Is No Hope That Any Will Be Rescued - Believe That Mine is Now On Fire

Charleston, W. Va., Jan. 30.—It is stated today that there were 91 men in the Stuart mine when an explosion occurred yesterday afternoon, and it is not believed that any will be taken out alive. The mine works were wrecked, so terrific was the explosion. Sixty coffins have arrived at the mine and 25 more are on the way.

It is thought the mine is on fire, but this cannot be determined until later, as the heat and smoke from the shaft is so intense and the men could not be reached for a day or so, even if the shaft was in working order. The rescuers cannot enter the mine on account of the gas.

Five Were Killed.

Marion, Ill., Jan. 30.—An explosion of powder in a mine at Johnson City today killed five and injured 11.

London, Jan. 30.—There is reason to think that the resignation of Sir Alex Swettenham as governor of Jamaica has been accepted, although the officials of the foreign office refuse any information on the subject.

Washington, Jan. 30.—The senate has agreed to vote on the resolution declaring Senator Smoot, of Utah, not entitled to his seat, at 4 o'clock on the afternoon of February 20.

MURDERER'S BROTHER MAKES FULL CONFESSION

New York, Jan. 30.—Howard Bell, half brother of John Bell, today broke down and made a full confession to District Attorney Kennedy, in which he told how John Bell had confessed to him that he had shot Dr. Townsend, the Staten Island physician, who was mysteriously shot last week. John Bell is in custody.

BALDWIN WORKS NOT BADLY DAMAGED

Philadelphia, Jan. 30.—A. B. Johnson, of the Baldwin Locomotive Works, part of whose plant was destroyed by fire last night, says the loss will not exceed \$500,000.

FOUR MILLION CHINESE ACTUALLY STARVING

Washington, Jan. 30.—From all sides received from China regarding the famine conditions existing there it is estimated that four million people are actually starving.

ANOTHER RUSSIAN GOVERNOR KILLED

Petersburg, Jan. 30.—M. Gidema, governor of the political division in Vasil Ostroff, a suburb of this city, was assassinated on the street today.

STANDARD OIL HEARING OPENS AT ST. LOUIS

St. Louis, Jan. 30.—The hearing upon the motion of the principal defendants in the government suit against the alleged Standard Oil monopoly, to set aside the order of service under which they were brought into the jurisdiction of the United States circuit court at St. Louis, was begun today before United States Judges Naborn, Hook, Adams, and Vandewater. Practically all of the seventy corporations and individuals named in the government suit were present or represented by counsel.
