INGHAM VINEGAR COMPANY'S NEW PORTLAND PLANT

Permit Issued for the Erection of a Three-Story Building. Eugene Plant Will Be Operated in Connection With the New One in the Metropolis

E. H. Ingham, of the Ingham Vinegar Company, is in Portland attending to the preliminary arrangements for the erection of the big vinegar factory which the company will erect in that city, and which has been mentioned by the Guard several times before. The Eugene plant will not be dismantled, as reported at different times, but will continue in operation and will be conducted in connection with the Portland plant. Yesterday's Portland Journal says:

"The Ingham Vinegar Company took out a permit yesterday to excavate for the foundation of a building, to be used as a vinegar factory, at the corner of Albina avenue and Goldsmith street. This company has recently acquired a quarter block there and will construct a three-story frame building, 100x100 feet. The entire cost of the plant will be about \$25,000. It is proposed to have the plant in operation by the early summer."
