NEW BANKING CONCERN FOR THIS CITY

San Francisco People File Articles of Incorporation With the Secretary of State and Intend to Establish Eight Banks in That Many Oregon Cities

A San Francisco concern has recently been organized to establish savings banks in several Oregon cities, Eugene included. One here to be known as the American Savings bank, according to the articles of incorporation which have just been filed at Salem. Some of the Eugene bankers were asked this morning if they knew who is backing the new concern, but none knew anything further than what they had seen in the newspapers. The Salem Journal of yesterday says:

Articles of incorporation were filed in the office of the secretary of state this morning by H. S. Myers, F. N. Myers, and M. S. Myers, of San Francisco, for eight banks to be located in as many different Oregon cities. The capital stock in each instance is \$5000. The banks are as follows: Grants Pass Savings Bank, of Grants Pass; Wasco County Bank, of The Dalles; Union Savings Bank, of Pendleton; Security Savings Bank, of Oregon City; Union Bank, of La Grande; American Savings Bank, of Eugene, and the Coos County Bank, of Marshfield.
