DON'T KISS OR YOU'LL GET THE GRIP

Dr. Gordon C. McCormack, son of Dr. and Mrs. H. F. McCormack, of Eugene, and who is assistant county physician at Portland, has gained fame by advocating the prevention of the grip. Yesterday's Telegram

Among other troubles the patient Portland citizen is obliged to put up with is an unusually aggravated epidemic of grip, which is recognizing neither creed, color, caste nor rank, and the careless habit of osculation which some people are afflicted with is helping to spread the plague, says Dr. C. C. McCormack, assistant county physician.

He cautions people to abstain from the habit, or to indulge in it sparingly; if they would escape the cloying effects of the dread influenza.

"Of course each winter Portland suffers more or less from grip epidemics, but the long continued cold spell we have had this year has aggravated it considerably, though I could hardly say it has reached an alarming stage. It is by all odds the common complaint, and every physician in town is kept busy treating cases of it, some of them being scarcely little more than bad colds, but all more or less akin to the old-fashioned grip.

"It is good medical advice to warn persons against indulging in the kissing habit, especially during a grip epidemic. I don't mean to say that this would prevent the spread of the disease germs, because it is a very prolific and hardy species, and it is carried from person to person even without actual contact between them. The air itself may be laden with them and can infect any number of persons and none of them know just how he managed to catch the disease."

HARRISBURG ENFORCES CURFEW ORDINANCE

Five Boys Found Playing Cards Late At Night in Vacant Room of Building.

Harrisburg, Or., Jan. 30.—Five boys are held at the city jail for alleged violation of the curfew ordinance. It is said that they had been in the habit of skating on roller skates in a large room on the second floor of the Mendonhall building until about 8 o'clock, the curfew hour, and would then turn out all the lights but one, which they would place on the floor so as to give the room the appearance of being deserted, and would then play cards until midnight or past.

The marshal, hearing of this, mounted the stairs last night and on becoming satisfied some boys were in there, again descended and proceeded to the jail, a short distance away, unlocked the door and returned. He knocked on the door, and on it being opened he requested the boys to accompany him, which they did.

It is said two boys made an exit by way of a back window, reaching the ground by way of a porch post, thus giving the marshal the slip for the time being.
