ton, of Lane, Simons, of Marion, Huntley, of Clackamas, Barrett, of Umatilla, Coffey, of Multnomah, and Kuhl, of Jackson. The special committee will come back with a new or an amended bill, making a contingent appropriation of \$300,000 to be expended in case the national government will increase the sum to what is needed.

In this shape the bill will probably pass, such being the indications after the debate yesterday afternoon. Leaders of the fight against the original bill included Newell, of Washington, and Vawter, of Jackson, who say they will support the new bill. Jones is ready to accept the compromise.

For an Open River

Claiming to be the sole owner of all the water power of the Willamette falls, the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company, owner of the Oregon City Locks, demanded in 1929 \$1,200,000 for its interests there, this sum representing not only the value of the locks, but also the water power drawn from the falls by the locks. This sum was almost four times the sum put on the locks in that year by a special board of United States engineers, which appraised them at \$310,500, including \$25,000 for right-of-way.

At the same time the board estimated that the cost of building new locks, according to one project, would be \$114,000, or, according to another project, \$131,000, both without right-of-way. At the present time the government engineers in Portland, under Colonel Roessler, estimate that new locks would cost between \$550,000 and \$600,000, without right-of-way, on account of the advanced cost of labor and materials. That the right-of-way cost for new

locks would greatly swell the total cost of building a new waterway is evident.

Should the state condemn the present locks, however, there is reason to believe that it could get possession of a boat waterway over the falls considerably cheaper than by trying to force the owners of the present locks to sell them, by threat of constructing new locks on the east side of the river.

The bill of Representative Jones, of Polk county, appropriating \$400,000 for free locks at Oregon City, came up in the house Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock as a special order of business, for final passage. It gives the state board authority to condemn right-of-way for new locks, but not to condemn the present locks.

The question of water ownership is an important one, since, even if the state should acquire the present locks the electric company, possessing the water, might not supply all the water needed for navigation at low stages of the river. It is the opinion of the United States officials that the electric company cannot take water needed for navigation purposes even though it claims the sole ownership of all the water power.

Bills Passed by the House.

Bills passed by the house Tuesday were as follows:

H. B. 96, Steen—Fixing salary of school superintendent of Umatilla county at \$1800 per annum.

H. B. 45, Barrett, Washington—Providing for taking up and disposing of stock running at large.

H. B. 63, Barrett, Umatilla—To prohibit driving animals on sidewalks and limiting to six miles an hour the speed of all such animals in all unincorporated towns.

H. B. 51, Northrup—Limiting liability of real estate of deceased persons for payment of debts to a period of six years from date of death.

H. B. 62, Barrett, Umatilla—Increasing penalties for intimidation of any judicial, legislative or executive officers.

H. B. 83, Freeman—Curing defects in deeds and other instruments now on record, whether executed in this or foreign lands.

H. B. 84, Freeman—Authorizing sale of property of estates when directed by testator in his will without the need of an order from the probate court.

H. B. 73, Perkins—To prevent false labeling or branding of fruits.

Bills Passed by Senate.

Bills were passed by the senate Tuesday as follows:

S. B. 63, Coshaw—To perfect title of lands formerly belonging to decedents.

S. B. 75, Coshaw—To declare certain marriages valid.

S. B. 83, Fairlie—To authorize creation of a corporation for the establishment of a Reed institute. The senate killed by indefinite postponement.

S. B. 76, Miller, of Linn-Marion—for employment of school physicians.

S. B. 75, Smith, of Marion—To repeal the Tule road law.

Appropriation Bill.

Salem, Jan. 30.—The general ap-

propriation bill for the expenses of the state government was introduced in the house yesterday afternoon, and for the first time a definite idea of what the leaders propose in the way of apportionments can be estimated.

The bill, No. 284, was introduced by Driscoll, of Multnomah, and has all the items usually contained in the general appropriation bill, other expenses, like the state university, agricultural institutes, normal schools and state printing plant being covered by special bills. The bill carries a total appropriation of \$1,244,970, which is fully as much as was expected and somewhat over the total of the estimate of the secretary of state published some time ago. The committee, however, has whittled off several yards of proposed expense from Salem institutional reports, and the Marion county delegation may be expected to arise and say things.

The committee gave the secretary of state all he asked for, and more, for it allowed him \$29,000 against the \$27,480 asked for clerks and incidentals. The bill lops off \$600 from the estimate of the amount needed for the payment of District Attorneys and their deputies. Instead of \$2400 travelling expenses, as estimated, the attorney general will have to go along with \$2000 if the bill passes. A hit at Salem interests is made when the bill chops off \$2500 of the amount estimated as needed for the general expenses of the state capitol, but in the next line the bill boosts the capitol improvement fund from the \$10,000 estimated to \$25,000.

The penitentiary gets \$121,000 instead of the \$113,000 estimated necessary, but the asylum loses heavily, for it is cut out of \$19,000 for repairs and \$237,000 for new buildings. This would leave the asylum authorities for another two years without room for the hundreds of patients that are coming to the already overflowing wards. The reform school will lose a betterment estimate of \$6000, the deaf mute estimate is chopped down \$17,500, and the institution for the blind loses \$8250 from its estimated appropriation, or about half the total given. The bill allows the governor \$5000 for the hire of special agents for arrest of fugitives from justice, instead of \$10,000, as recommended. It cuts the estimated traveling and per diem legislative appropriation from \$55,000 to \$50,000, which will be saved through the absence of expensive jaunting or investigating committees. In all other respects the bill exactly follows the secretary of state's estimate.

The house yesterday, 28 ayes to 30 noes, voted down Newell's anti-pool selling bill, designed to stop gambling at the state fair grounds.

CONFERENCE AT THE HAGUE FORECASTED

Washington, Jan. 31.—It is stated on good authority that neither the question of international disarmament, including the kindred subject of restriction, nor the Drago doctrine will be placed on the program of the subjects to be considered at The Hague conference when it convenes in June or July. But every effort will be made to have the conference consider the two subjects named, though this can only be properly supported by their principals. The Washington government hopes these subjects will receive favorable consideration, the majority of the delegates enabling them to be discussed.

May Appoint Negro.

It is admitted at the White House that the president has under consideration the name of Ralph Tyler, a negro, of Columbus, for the position of surveyor of customs at Cincinnati. No decision has yet been reached in the matter, however.

Postmasters Named.

The president today nominated the following postmasters: Oregon—H. A. Snyder, Aurora. Washington—Chewelah, C. F. Legg; South Bend, F. R. Wright.

THIRTY BODIES AT FOOT OF SHAFT

Charleston, W. Va., Jan. 31.—The mangled and dismembered bodies of at least thirty of the eighty or more victims of Tuesday's disaster in the Stuart mine were piled up about the foot of the shaft when the rescuing party reached the mine level last evening. It is impossible, owing to the condition of their bodies, to begin their removal until the cage is repaired. It is believed that not one who was in the mine escaped death.

TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS.

The Russian evacuation of Manchuria was begun today with the departure of the Moscow regiment.

The grand jury in New York today returned an indictment against members of the so-called theatrical trust, alleging conspiracy in restraint of trade.

In the senate yesterday Carter, of Montana, severely criticized Secretary of the Interior Hitchcock. The criticism was based on the order of the secretary of last December which prohibits the issuance of a patent to land under any of the laws until after examination of the ground by a special agent. Senator Carter some time ago presented a resolution which denies the right of any executive officer to prevent the granting of a patent when the law under which it is claimed has been carried out. He asserted the order referred to expressed the final estimate of the secretary as to the truth and veracity, the honor and integrity and the good faith of all settlers on the public domain in the United States.
