## WALLA WALLA'S EXAMPLE.

The spirit that builds cities was exemplified by Walla Walla a few days ago, and its example should apply with force to cities like Eugene, Salem, Cottage Grove, Albany and others, all of which are situated in the Willamette valley and have many interests in common. The Spokane Spokesman-Review discusses the "Walla Walla spirit" in a leading editorial, and what it says of the upbuilding of the "Inland Empire," through persistent and harmonious effort, applies with particular force to the growing cities of Western Oregon. The Spokesman-Review says:

"Encouragement of a spirit of a neighborly friendship between cities was notably manifested in the gathering at Walla Walla Tuesday night. As guests of the Commercial Club of that city there were present delegates representing the businessmen of Dayton, Walsburg, Pendleton, Prescott, Athena, Milton, and Freewater, and the hospitable entertainment given them by their hosts was characteristic of Walla Walla. That city has done itself a good turn and has performed an important service to the commercial interests of the surrounding district by its initiative in this matter.

"It is becoming one of the notable features of business life in the Inland Empire to have social gatherings of this kind, where, around the banquet table, important matters are discussed from a common standpoint and a communal interest in the welfare of one another is established. In Spokane this new and distinctly western method of promoting commercial development has been noticeable for the past year or two. The idea is spreading, and wherever adopted good results are sure to follow.

"Walla Walla is rapidly forging to the front as a centre of business industry and energy. With the recent inauguration of a street railway system and other improvements it is taking on metropolitan airs and establishing for itself an enviable reputation. It has no doubt gained for itself, to a greater extent than ever, the good will of neighboring towns by the generous welcome to its visitors this week. It is safe to say there has been created in the breast of all of them a livelier interest and a stronger determination to mutually help one another in the march of progress.

"The cultivation of this spirit is going to be one of the most important factors in the development of the inland empire. It has no place for sectional or local jealousies. While the friendship of cities and towns for one another is being cemented there is a closer coming together of the business men of individual localities, an effacement of jealous rivalry without banishing friendly competition, which is the foundation of commercial vigor and a keener interest in the upbuilding of every separate community."

## The Storers

Bellamy, Former Ambassador to Austria-Hungary, and His Clover Wife, Who Has Won Fame as Pottery Expert and Diplomat—Her Influence With Two Presidents

MR. AND MRS. BELLAMY STORER, who figure in the controversy between them and President Roosevelt, which has occupied so large a share of attention, belong to families which have taken a leading part in the affairs of the state of Ohio and of the nation. For some years they were both on terms of intimacy with Mr. Roosevelt; hence when misunderstandings arose and the friendship of years was broken bitter feelings were left.

Mr. Storer is the son of the late Bellamy Storer, who was one of the best known politicians of his day. He was in congress during the thirties and was a friend and ally of Daniel Webster. He was also noted as a jurist. The representative of the family who is now in the limelight was born in Cincinnati in 1847, and at twenty he received his diploma from Harvard university. Subsequently he studied law at the Cincinnati Law school, graduated from that institution in 1869, was admitted to the bar the same year and for some years thereafter practiced his profession in Cincinnati. He had an ambition to go to congress, as his father had done, and in 1890 was elected to the house of representatives, in which he served two terms. In the house he was a member of the committee on foreign relations, and this association engendered in him a desire for a diplomatic career. He was on terms of special friendship with Mr. McKinley, and when the latter became president he furthered his friend's ambition by appointing him minister to Belgium and at the close of the Spanish war promoted him to be minister to Spain. Like Mr. McKinley, Mr. Roosevelt entertained a special liking for the Ohio diplomat, and when he came to the White House soon

## DESPERATE FIGHT BETWEEN JAP FROGS

Six Thousand Betrechiens Attack and Rout Four Thousand Frogs.

The Japanese Times publishes a remarkable account of a desperate battle which recently took place in a valley in Ojima, in the Horima prefecture, between two armies of frogs.

A corps of about 4,000 frogs took up a strong position at the entrance to the valley and were attacked by an invading army in two divisions of 8,000 each.

The battle began at 9 in the morning and continued amid an indescribable scene of bustle and noise of croaking until 10 o'clock next day.

There were many interested spectators of the unusual spectacle, and amid great excitement the invaders ousted the defending army and overran the valley, croaking their triumph as they went.

More than 700 frog warriors were killed and 2,000 wounded.

The method of warfare adopted by the frogs was to jump at each other fiercely and snap and bite until mortal injuries were inflicted or they became exhausted.
