ABANDON NATRON EXTENSION

Gould and Harriman Have Come to
An Agreement Which May Tie up
Proposed Railroad Building,
Gould Agent Withdrawn from
Lane County

The Guard yesterday printed an item to the effect that the Drain-Coos Bay railroad project may be abandoned by Harriman. It is also said that the Natron-Klamath extension may never be built, at any rate not very soon. An exchange says:

"The hope of the Pacific coast for relief in the matter of carrying freight has been the building of the Western Pacific railroad. It is now announced that Gould, of the Western Pacific, and Harriman have compromised their differences, and that hence there will be no competing roads. The Gould road had an agent in Lane county most of last summer and fall buying lumber. This new combination will take him away, as it has already called in the surveyors. It may do more, stop building the Drain-Coos Bay branch, as well as the Natron-Klamath project. The people might not feel nervous because one system occupied a territory if it would only do the business, but when a part of the country is neglected there is provocation for discontent. Just now the only probability for relief is in the trolley roads. The method of operation is so different from steam that combinations are not so easily made. If competition by that means falls then resort must be had to legislation."

From the start the game was close, though there was never any doubt as to who would finally win the contest, as the local team kept a comfortable lead over their opponents the entire game.

The Salem team started the scoring when McIntyre made a pretty shot for the basket, a few minutes after the ball was put in play. Kestley, Eugene's forward and captain, followed with four, and Farmer, of Salem, threw another one for the visitors in the half. The score, 12 to 8.

The additional points were made on fouls.

The second half was more interesting, Salem throwing four field goals and Eugene five. Rough work by the visitors netted two points on fouls for the home team, making the final score 22 to 16.

Salem played some pretty team work, but were not as adept shooting baskets as the local five. Moors, a little forward, seemed to play the best basketball for the Capital City lads. Kestley, for the home five, did some really fancy basket shooting, though his men played every bit as good as he on the floor.
