UNIVERSITY'S NEEDS

Because the University of Oregon is asking \$125,000 a year in order to meet its most pressing needs some of the state papers think the request unreasonably high. Compared with other states, however, it is very reasonable, as the following dispatch relating to California's state university will indicate:

University of California, Berkeley, Cal., Feb. 4.—The university appropriation bills which have been pending before the state legislature for some time have passed the third reading and will come up for debate in a few days. The bills include the following appropriations: \$101,000 to make up for the deficit in the running expenses caused by the San Francisco fire; \$6000 for the chair of music, established last year; \$250,000 to add to the Doe library fund; and \$32,000 for the farmers' institutes. The \$250,000 of the appropriation for the Doe library fund added to the \$750,000 of the fund will give the university a magnificent structure, costing \$1,000,000. The committee in charge of the bill has reported favorably on it, so there is little apprehension felt for its defeat. The success of the bill is largely due to the efforts of President Wheeler, who has been at the capital for some time.

There is no question but Oregon's university needs liberal treatment at this time, in order to make up for the economical appropriations of past years. More room is needed for old departments, while new ones must be added and the faculty increased quite materially.

MEMORIAL DAY LEGISLATION.

J. W. Geary Post, G. A. R., of this city, demands the passage of a bill providing against the desecration of Memorial Day with sports and amusements, and wishes to enforce the closing of business houses during the exercises on that day. On the same subject Sumner Post, No. 12, of Portland, takes a radically opposite view, declaring against any legislation on the subject at all, using the following language:

Resolved, That we believe any law restricting human action and freedom of conscience on Memorial Day, or any other day, is impracticable and impossible of enforcement; and that any law not strictly enforced is contaminating in effect upon all law, and serves in making the enforcement of necessary laws more difficult, besides engendering in the minds of the masses a contempt and a disregard for all law.

In these circumstances what is a poor legislator, who desires to please the old soldiers, going to do?

The merchants of Dayton, Or., have organized a mutual fire insurance company—an example that should be followed by every town on the Pacific coast. Rates of insurance, always high, have been boosted since the San Francisco fire until they are almost prohibitive, and there is no reason why the citizens of a town might not carry their own insurance more cheaply and just as securely. This matter has been discussed by Eugene's commercial bodies, but no action has been taken tending to definite results.

On March 1 a very low rate will go into effect on the railroads to stimulate Western travel for 60 days,

during which the fare from Missouri river points to Eugene will be but \$25, and from Chicago \$33. In order to secure the greatest possible advantages from this low rate it would be well if our people who have friends in the East would write to them at once, calling attention to the excellent opportunity it will give them of coming West, either to remain permanently or to look over the country. Another good idea would be to write letters to your former home papers in the East calling attention to this low rate, as it might be given wider publicity in that manner.

Mrs. Platt, the near-divorced wife of the senior New York senator, must have the idea that the Washington papers are making too much money, as she has sued two of them for a half million as damages for libelous publications relating to her recent separation from her husband.

Since the Italian ambassador declared in a public lecture that President Roosevelt was endowed with a remarkable power of restraint, Senator Foraker must have wondered whether the distinguished Dago is a humorist.

It is all right for its minister, in Washington, to talk about "Bolly-la—a country without debt," but before we enthuse it will be as well to ascertain whether it is without debt, like some men, for lack of credit.

Congressman Candler, of Mississippi, has made the astonishing discovery that it is the cotton crop, not the law, which maintains the gold standard. Verily, this Candler has been hiding his light too long.

Senator Dupont says he doesn't own a cent's worth of stock in the powder trust, but, as it is controlled by his family he wisely refrained from saying he has no interest in its success.

Officials still on the canal payroll seem to be of the opinion that "Teddy" Shonts is a better claimer than digger, and the civil service commission is said to regard him as the against.

Whether Harry Thaw will be punished may be problematical, but the punishment of the jurymen who will try him for murder started when they were sworn in by order of the judge.

We are sending too much of our gold abroad. We are buying foreign novelties and letting our GOLD go to Europe. We are spending too much money.

THE MONEY OUGHT TO BE KEPT HERE IN THE UNITED STATES, FOR JUST AS SURELY AS WE SEND TOO MUCH OF OUR GOLD TO THE OTHER SIDE JUST SO SURELY WILL WE HAVE TO PAY THE PENALTY OF OUR RASHNESS.

We are using up our resources at a tremendous rate, but that is not our chief danger now. Our peril lies in our parting with the resources we have, and we are likely to find ourselves IN NEED IN THE FUTURE for this very reason.
