CONSUMPTIVE COWS MUST DIE

According to the Portland Telegram war has been declared by the state board of health on cattle infected with tuberculosis. Animals with the tuberculosis are often used as milk cows. This milk contains tubercular germs and the disease is in this manner contracted by those who drink the milk or use it in their food. An infected animal will also spread the disease to other animals in the herd, and the germs will linger for a long time in barns where diseased cows are kept.

Inspections have been made of the herds at the state insane asylum and state prison at Salem, and many of the animals used as milk cows have been found infected. These have been ordered destroyed, and a careful watch kept on the remainder of the animals.

Directions have been given county health officers throughout the state to make inspections of milk and cattle, and whenever they detect the animals infected with tuberculosis to have them killed. The officials manifest considerable interest in the matter, and the board of health expects that in the future reports will be obtained from the various counties covering the condition of every dairy herd in the state. It may take months or even years to accomplish this, but the members of the board are determined to proceed.

Dr. J. W. Harris, of Lane county, is regarded as one of the most active officials in the state in his efforts to detect contagious diseases among cattle, and have them slaughtered. In November he had two cows with lump jaw killed, and two in December. During January he discovered three tubercular dairy cows, immediately condemned them and had them put out of the way. Dr. Harris in his report to the state health board says:

"I shall use my utmost endeavors in matters of this character to eradicate even the possibility of the disease, as far as the law may sustain me in doing so."

Members of the state board of health have commended Dr. Harris for his activity and are attempting to get other health officers to follow his example.

JUSTICE FOR BOHEMIA

With no desire to rob Douglas county of any territory that is rightfully hers, and with only the friendliest of feelings for our neighbors on the south, The Guard is compelled to take the stand that the Bohemia mines should be annexed to Lane county. They are much more accessible to their trading point (Cottage Grove) and Eugene, the county seat, than to Roseburg or any other town in Douglas county. Good wagon roads lead out in this direction and there is a railroad from Cottage Grove to the edge of the district, and these mines must come out through Lane county to attend to any official or court business, making such matters unreasonably expensive to them.

Douglas county has ignored this mining district, so far as building roads or making any improvements

for its benefit are concerned, leaving it to Lane county to do all of this work, and for that reason alone its claim to the territory, which geographically belongs to this county, is slight.

The question seems not to be one of land grabbing, but is based upon the rights of the inhabitants in the territory affected by the boundary change, and our Douglas county neighbors should lay aside all selfish interests and consider it from a broader viewpoint.

Need of an Inheritance Tax

UNLESS the supreme court should change its views there seems to be no question that the general government may CONSTITUTIONALLY impose an inheritance tax. The supreme court has been known to change its views, but I am inclined to think it will be more apt to reverse its final decision on the INCOME TAX and again hold, as it formerly held, that such a tax was constitutional, than to reverse itself on the inheritance tax and hold that unconstitutional.

If the validity of such a tax can be established by LONG ACQUIESCENCE, certainly this has been done. In 1797 an inheritance tax was imposed by this government. In the hour of need of the civil war the government again imposed an inheritance tax. Its constitutionality was questioned, but was AFFIRMED. An inheritance tax was imposed during the Spanish war, and again the court held that a progressive and inheritance tax was constitutional.

Inheritance taxes have for some time been imposed by most European countries.

OURS IS NOW THE ONLY GREAT POWER IN WHICH NO IMPOSITION OF THIS KIND IS MADE BY THE GENERAL GOVERNMENT.

We are sadly in need of a national inheritance tax NOW.

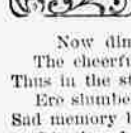
A Poem for Today

THE LIGHT OF OTHER DAYS

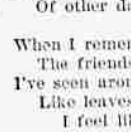

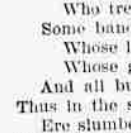
FT in the stilly night,

RANGE NEAR ROSEBURG

Adjutant General Finzer, of the Oregon National Guard, is in the city looking for a suitable piece of ground for a target range, the legislature having appropriated \$16,000 for the establishment of ranges throughout the state, says the Roseburg Review. General Finzer has opened negotiations for an ideal tract of land for the purpose wanted, but the result will not be known for some time yet, as the purchase, if any is made, must be confirmed by higher authority. General Finzer declined to comment on the recent order of the secretary of war, placing estate militias on a war footing, as regards what significance it bore to the pending dispute with Japan. He expressed his personal opinion, however, that war between Japan and this country would occur sooner or later.

HOP ROOTS KILLED

BY LATE HARD FREEZE

According to reports from all sections of the state local dealers estimate that 20 per cent of the hop roots of the 25,000 acres of the state have been killed, and that the effect will be to increase the price for 1906 holdings in dealers' and growers' hands at least five cents per pound within the present week. Blight to the hops was due to the extreme drought of the summer which sapped the vitality of the roots, followed by the winter's freeze, which penetrated to and froze the crowns of the stands. In some cases reported almost the entire yards will have to be replanted.—Salem Journal.
