SPRINGFIELD JUNCTION TO HAVE DEPOT

**Southern Pacific Asks County Court
to Allow Building to Be Erected
on What Is Now Part of County
Road—Company to Buy Addi-
tional Land for Road.**

J. B. Eddy, right-of-way agent for the Southern Pacific Company, appeared before the county commissioners' court this forenoon and announced that the company intends to erect a depot at Springfield Junction, formerly known as Henderson station, but in order to do so it is necessary to encroach upon the county road. He made a proposition to the court that the company pay for a strip of land to widen the road at that place so that there would be room for the depot without making the road any narrower than it is at present.

It is proposed to build the depot 440 feet west of the box car that is a present doing duty for a depot, and it will be located south of the track. The road that will be affected by the building of the depot is the one leading up to the Laurel Grove cemetery. The proposed depot will extend into the road about ten feet and the length of the strip wanted by the company is 52 feet. It is proposed to purchase a strip of land that wide from Carrie Winter, the owner of the land adjoining the depot site, and use it in widening the road.

The court seems disposed to accommodate the railroad company in this regard, and as there will be no expense to the county it is probable that the order will be issued. Of course the usual red tape procedure will have to be gone through with and it will be some time before the transfer of the strip of land in question can be made to the county.

It is not known when the company intends to erect the depot, but it is thought it will be this summer.

Petitions Presented.

Mr. Eddy also presented a petition for a telephone line to be built along the county road between the company's sawmills Nos. 2 and 3 on the Mohawk, and for the privilege of building a lumber flume over certain county roads between Marcola and Mabel and Marcola and Wendling.

MAIMED FOR LIFE BECAUSE HE HUNG ON TRAINS

Arthur McMahan, of Harrisburg, Sustained Broken Leg Besides His Mangled Arm—Additional Particulars.

Junction City, Or., Feb. 5.—Additional particulars of the serious injuries suffered Sunday evening by Arthur McMahan at Harrisburg by being run over by a freight train have been received, showing that besides the mangled arm reported from this place yesterday his right leg was broken below the knee. It is also apparent that the lad is the victim of the propensity of youth to steal aboard freight cars and ride about the yards while they are sidetracking or switching.

The accident occurred Sunday evening about 8:30 as an extra freight was siding in order to let the south-bound local pass. A number of boys decided to ride down the switch on the freight, among them Arthur McMahan, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. McMahan. The night being very dark he failed to see the cattle guard, and, expecting to swing to the ground, he came in contact with the slanting side of it, which shunted him toward the moving train, and in his efforts to save himself his right arm was thrown across the rail. It was mangled from the wrist to the elbow, the hand being completely severed from the arm. His right leg was broken between the knee and the ankle. A companion, Hugh Hardisty, hearing his outcry and ran down the track. Seeing him on the cattle guard, kicking with all his might, he held him down until the train passed, it coming to a standstill but a few feet from the boy. The Hardisty boy propped him up and ran for help. Dr. Dale, being at the depot, hastened down the track with others and bound the boy's arm to stop the flow of blood. He was immediately carried to Dr. Dale's residence and Dr. Williams, of Junction City, was sent for. He soon arrived on a speeder. They amputated the arm at the elbow and will save the rest of it if blood poison does not set in. He is resting easy today.

ASTORIA ROAD WILL EXTEND TO YAQUINA

A report from Astoria has been circulated to the effect that the Astoria & Columbia River Railroad Company's general passenger and freight department, at the head of which is J. C. Mayo, would be removed from Astoria to Portland, says the Journal. The rumor is regarded as significant in view of the recent purchase of this road by the Northern Pacific Railway. Regarding the removal of the passenger and freight department and the work of extension of the A. & C. line from Seaside south along the coast to Yaquina, General Manager Gay Talbot said:

"There has been no order made for removal of the freight and passenger department to Portland. No decision has been made to that effect. Nothing has been done that would give ground for such a rumor. We have simply discussed the question here in the light of a possible change of convenience.

"The work of extension of the line from Seaside south is progressing slowly on account of unfavorable weather. We will push this extension to Yaquina. The surveys have been completed. We have not asked for concessions from the towns and farmers, and do not expect to ask anything unreasonable. The line will follow a water grade. At Netarts it will pass about four miles inland. There are many places where fine summer resorts may be located."

The road from Seaside southward will be practically all new. From Seaside to Warrenton a new survey will be made and a line will be adopted following the beach, where better grades and a better scenic line will be secured. It is said the company has no intention of abandoning the old Warrenton track, but will operate a stub train over it.

The new road when completed will be on a water grade from Yaquina to Portland, tapping a country of vast timber resources and probably coal deposits. It is understood that the Northern Pacific will operate it as a separate corporation, with independent management. The road taps the outlet to many fine logging streams, including the Nehalem, the Wilson river, the Trask, the Nestucca, Schooner creek, the Siletz and the Yaquina.

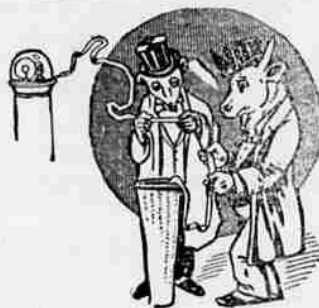
