

**TWO MORE  
CONDEMNATION  
SUITS FILLED**

Oregon Eastern Railway Company  
Wants Order of Court to Appro-  
priate Right-of-Way Through  
Land Owned by Clarence McBee  
and Keeney Heirs

Two more condemnation suits for right-of-way for the Natron-Klamath-Ontario extension of the Southern Pacific Company's railroad were filed in the circuit court today by the Oregon Eastern, under which name the line will be built. These suits are against Clarence McBee and wife and J. M. Keeney and others, heirs of A. J. Keeney, and both pieces of land which the company wishes to go through are situated in section 28, township 13, south of range 1 e. This is a short distance above Lowell. As in the complaints filed yesterday, and mentioned by the Guard, the company asks the court to assess damages and issue an order appropriating the right-of-way.

The Smeed tract, involved in one of the suits filed yesterday, is situated near Fall Creek, and the tract belonging to Gibson et al., the McCumber heirs, is near Jasper. The Guard learns that several other suits will be brought from time to time, wherever the right-of-way agent, Major Edwards, has been unable to agree with the owners of the property upon the price to be paid for the land.

There have been reports to the effect that the company intends to abandon the Natron extension, but the bringing of these suits would indicate otherwise. The attorneys for the company in these suits are W. D. Fenton and R. A. Letter, of Portland, and J. M. Pipes, of Eugene.

**SECURE BIG TRACT OF  
CALIFORNIA TIMBER**

**EXCITING EXPERIENCE IN  
CROSSING LONG TOM**

Dr. Prosser and Driver Crossed River  
Two Miles Wide With Water Over  
Bottom of Buggy Bed.

Dr. W. O. Prosser had a very exciting experience in crossing the Long Tom river during the high water. Sunday night he received a call by telephone to go to Goldson's mill, west of Franklin, to attend a sick person. He engaged a buggy and team at Yates' livery stable, taking along as a driver Isaac Bowers. They were unable to cross the Long Tom on the road on which they started, so went around by the way of Franklin. As they neared the river a vast lake of water stretched out before them, thought to have been nearly two miles wide. They had many misgivings as to the advisability of attempting to cross but upon telephoning to Mr. Spencer, who lives on the opposite side of the river, they learned that the water over the bridge was not so deep as it looked, and after securing one of the Bryan boys to come across on horseback and lead the way, they set out through the water. In crossing the bridge the water came up to the bed of the buggy and several times the vehicle was on the verge of being swept away. When they returned the next day the river was several inches higher and looked much worse than the day previous, but the doctor and his driver were determined to reach home that day and again urged the horses into the swift current. By advancing very slowly and with great caution they finally succeeded in crossing, but had to exert all their skill as drivers to keep the horses on the highest portion of the road. All the time the waters were swirling past them in a great torrent, and had the buggy been lighter it would have certainly been swept away.

**WIRELESS IS  
IN OPERATION  
AT NORTH HEAD**

Astoria, Feb. 5.—T. P. Shea, who has been erecting the wireless telegraph station at North Head, was in the city today and reports that the plant is completed and is now in operation. Two operators are employed there at present, but the force will be increased in the near future. Mr. Shea says the plant is working well and that messages have already been sent to the Bremerton navy yard, Tatoosh, Mare Island, and even to San Diego. The station will be connected by wire with the weather bureau station in this city, so that reports can be sent here. The next wireless station to be erected on this coast will be at Cape Blanco, but construction will not be commenced until next summer.
