EDITOR HOFER ON THE SCHOOLS

Colonel E. Hofer, editor of the Salem Journal, who knows all about everything from strawberry culture and poultry raising to running the national government, prints the following roast on the Oregon school system:

"The legislature ought to abolish the eighth grade teachers' certificates and the 'bum' normal schools. But it can't do that; the whole state educational system needs wiping out and a new one started, but it takes brains for that and they are not available. In Linn county the other day three-fourths of the eighth graders were rejected. The third grade teachers' certificate is another humbug. There are really only two grades of school teachers, good ones and those yet in the sap. The bill that went through the senate to put two of the state school machine onto the text book commission ought to be killed. It is a move to put the text book business back into the hands of the Rigler push, where the state rescued it from odium a few years ago. The American Book Company should get its books back into the public schools by merit, not by the advocacy of its hired men, and under the guise of legislation."

Rev. Father Black in his address at the Catholic fair last evening made a decided hit. He declared his belief that Eugene was destined to be the big city of the upper Willamette valley, and impressed upon his audience the necessity of the people pulling together for the up-building of the community—for united effort in securing electric railways, paved streets and other necessities of municipal advancement. Father Black's talk was along practical lines and was warmly applauded, as it well deserved to be.

There is to be another convention of shippers and lumbermen at Cottage Grove Saturday afternoon to discuss the matter of freight rates, and forming plans for bringing their grievances before the present legislature.

The East Eugene Improvement Club is doing good work by its dissemination of matters that pertain to the growth of Fairmount, a most beautiful residence section of the city. The subjects discussed at the last meeting of the club were varied and the action taken cannot be too highly commended.

Just now there seems to be a splendid opportunity for Eugene to secure a new depot—by taking Springfield Junction into the city limits. The S. P. Co. announces its intention of building one out there.

Ex-Football Star Denies Report That He Will Return to U. of O.

According to an article appearing in the Telegram, under a Eugene date line, Frank Templeton, who played a star half back during the football season of 1904-05, on the U. of O. football team, will return to the state university again next year and graduate.

Mr. Templeton was in the city last night and after reading the article stated that it was entirely wrong and that he had not the slightest intention of returning to the university again. "I am now in business," said he, "and no matter what my preferences might be, will not return to school again." Templeton quit college a year ago this February, and has since become a member of the Portland commission firm of Templeton & Rice. He is in the city on business connected with the firm.—Albany Herald.

The author, who gained fame also as a painter, was born in Pennsylvania in 1822 and died in New York city, May 11, 1872. His early education was neglected, and he gained a livelihood as a cigar maker and itinerant sign painter. Later his portraits and poems brought him an income and enabled him to travel and study abroad. Among others of his poems are "The New Pastoral" and "The Waggoner of the Alleghenies."
