SHIPPERS WILL HOLD MEETING NEXT SATURDAY

Cottage Grove Commercial Club Calls
Another Convention at That City.
Plants to Present Grievances of
Lumbermen and Shippers to the
Legislature

Guard Special Service.

Cottage Grove, Feb. 5.—A meet-
ing of the lumbermen and shippers of
central Oregon has been called for
Saturday, February 9th, 1907, at 2
o'clock p. m., at Cottage Grove. The
object is to discuss ways and means
to best present the grievances of the
lumbermen and shippers of this por-
tion of the state to the legislature,
caused by the announcement of a
prohibitive rate advance from \$3.10
to \$5 per ton, which is equivalent to
\$3.17 per thousand feet on rough
green lumber to California bay
points, by the Southern Pacific Com-
pany. The maintenance of this rate
simply means ruin to the lumber
business of Central Oregon. The
timber of this section, by reason of
geographical location and character,
is destined always to find its best
market in California, as 60 per cent
of the average log is low grade and
must necessarily have the present
freight rate maintained in order to
pay the cost of manufacture and suc-
cessfully meet competition.

The railroad company established
the \$3.10 per ton rate about nine
years ago at the instigation of C. H.
Markham, then in control of the
freight department of the Southern
Pacific lines in Oregon. This rate
was based on the water rate of \$5
per thousand feet from Columbia
river and Oregon coast points to Cal-
ifornia, and was maintained until the
recent San Francisco disaster tempo-
rarily advanced charter rates, which
are now receding, and in all proba-
bility within the next sixty days will
again be normal.

The result of the inauguration of
this rate was to stimulate and en-
courage the building of the numer-
ous small mills now in existence.
On no other basis could they have
existed or could the great lumber in-
dustry of Central Oregon ever have
been developed. This fact was proved
to the satisfaction of the railroad
company three years ago, when the
rate was raised to \$5 per ton for six
months, causing the greatest stagna-
tion and general depression of the
lumber business ever witnessed in
any portion of the state. Why
again invite disaster? The reply of
the Harriman system is "Go East
with your product." This is largely
a delusion, as the majority of the
small mills are unable to avail them-
selves of this opportunity from the
fact that their methods of manufac-
ture and equipment are not suited
to cater to the Eastern trade, and
they do not feel justified in attempt-
ing to make the necessary changes,
having no assurance that the rail-
roads may not also increase the East-
ern rate just as soon as they think
the traffic will bear an advance. The
rate on lumber which permits ship-
ment to California has been the di-
rect means of adding thousands of
dollars to the wealth of the state
and the railroad beneficiary by the in-
creased business and the maintain-
ing of exceedingly high local tariffs.

The company was losing at the rate
of a half million dollars a year when
the foresight of Mr. Markham dis-
covered a means of changing a large
yearly deficit into a dividend-earning
policy, as shown by the company's
own financial statement on file with
the secretary of state. The South-
ern Pacific Company has complained
bitterly of the advance in price of
lumber for its own use. For years it
purchased ties for \$6.19 per thou-
sand and feet, and when the mills re-
fused to cut their timber any longer
for less than cost the railroad com-
pany, at the instigation of the man-
agement, caused three mills to be
built and are planning a fourth in
order to further coerce the small
mills to accede to their wishes in the
price of lumber. The timber the
railroad is cutting was placed in its
hands by a generous but too confi-
ding government in trust to be sold
to actual settlers at \$2.50 per acre,
to assist in the development of the
state. The company has not only be-
trayed its trust in not selling these
lands in accordance with the pro-
visions of the grant, but absolute-
ly refuses to sell them at any price,
thereby retarding the development
of the state, but have become a com-
petitor against the principal industry
they fostered and nurtured into life.
If the railroad company may lawfully
engage in the lumber business

against its patrons under undue ad-
vantages, it can with equal propriety
invade every other line of business
along its route. The railroad com-
pany, with cool, calculating delib-
eration, has insisted on raising the
rates during the present long period
of car shortage, leaving the unfor-
tunate lumberman with large accum-
ulated stocks, cancelled orders, and
in many instances a depleted credit.

NEW SECRET SOCIETY AT HIGH SCHOOL

There has been a secret society
organized at the high school known
as the "Skiddoo Club." This is the
first society of this kind ever formed
here, and is very novel for a high
school. The club is founded on the

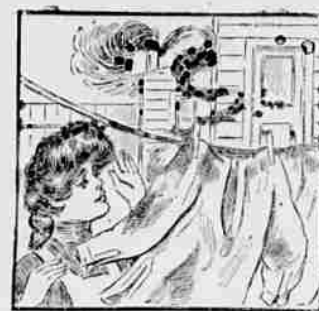
