Portland Market Report

Portland, Ore., Feb. 7
Reports coming from San Francisco and through trade papers show that the potato market there is somewhat easier, though no drop in quotations of a considerable character had been made up to yesterday. Early today there was wire trouble and dealers were not posted up to noon on the Bay City situation.

Recent receipts of Oregon potatoes at San Francisco have run up to from 2000 to 3000 sacks per day and these heavy receipts, added to the California product, have kept up the supplies to considerably over requirements.

Locally the market is at a standstill, there being no chance to move stocks from the country—rail trouble, high water, bad roads and recent unfortunate weather combining to cause a stoppage in shipments.

Fortunately stocks in dealers' ware houses are fairly large and are held steady against demands of city trade.

Sweet potato stocks are falling low and but few more are expected.

Good Lots of Vegetables

Trade in vegetables continued brisk this morning and prices were generally well kept up to last week's figures.

A car of Los Angeles cabbage arrived and was practically disposed of before the day's end. Small crate (85 pounds) sold at 2 1/2 c per pound, while the choicer size brought 3c.

Cauliflower was in good demand, and rapidly brought \$2.50 a crate.

The street presented a very busy scene this morning, for, in addition to the regular traffic, dealers were moving stocks from the docks, where high water had covered the lower floors early in the day.

Country Produce Slow

There is still no activity in the poultry market, and while receipts were rather light, there was also a small demand that was easily met.

Eggs are unchanged, 40c being top named today at the principal houses, and 37 1/2 c as the more usual figure quoted. Receipts below normal.

Injury Reported to Hop Vines

Reports of injury to hop vines in several localities, through alternating cold and thaw, continue to come in.

Growers who have offices in Portland are not inclined to place much credence in the scary character of the freeze news, and claim that so far as can be learned and based upon previous years' experience, there is no reason to fear any considerable loss in the hop yards.

Every winter more or less freezing out of roots occurs, they say, and is to be expected now.

Several large lots of '07s were reported as changing hands yesterday at from 9 1/2 c to 10 1/2 c.

An effort is being made to bring in something over the West Side line today, but it is problematical whether it can be accomplished. The high water puts a stop to boat shipments, and the outlook for the next few days is pretty bad all around. Another load of hogs will probably get through during the afternoon, but that is everything that can be counted upon with any degree of certainty.
