CRY LUMBERMEN
OF OREGON**

Vials of Wrath Poured Out at the Increase in Rates to Bay Points. Chapin Bill Is Indorsed - Protective Organization of Millmen to Be Formed

Cottage Grove, Feb. 10.—The large delegation that gathered yesterday afternoon in response to a call of the Cottage Grove Commercial Club, to the lumbering and other shipping interests of Central Oregon, indorsed the Chapin bill, with its railroad commission feature, demanded the retention of the old rate on lumber to Bay Points, named a committee to prepare for a protective organization of the Willamette Valley lumbermen, and passed stinging resolutions aimed against Harriman methods. The meeting was called to order by President Hinds of the club.

On account of the delayed trains of the Southern Pacific many who intended participating were unable to be present. They showed their interest by sending letters, telegrams and telephone messages, and promised that they could be relied upon, and would give the matters in question their moral support. The Chapin bill creating a railroad commission was brought up and the situation discussed at considerable length, together with announcement of the Southern Pacific of a raise of rates of \$3.11 per thousand to San Francisco and other Bay points. It was the unanimous sentiment that the Chapin bill as amended be passed, and that strong representation be made to the Legislature, demanding the passage of this measure.

In order to ascertain the actual condition existing in Central Oregon as to the status of the lumbering conditions, the following questions were adopted, to be sent to all the mills to be filled out and immediately:

What is your business?
On what railroad are you located?
What is the capacity of your mill?
Where do you sell your product chiefly?
Have you had any trouble marketing your product the past season?
Have you had any orders cancelled?

What is the ruling price for ties, and what has the Southern Pacific Railroad offered you for ties, if any offer has been made?

Has it agreed to furnish cars if you will sell it ties?

Do you run full time, and if not, when did you shut down, and for how long?

Are you well supplied with orders? Can you get plenty of cars for Eastern shipment?

Do you believe in reciprocal demurrage and a railroad commission, as outlined in the Chapin bill?

The following resolutions were read and adopted:

Indorsement of Chapin Bill
Resolved, That it is the sense of this mass meeting of shippers and lumbermen of Central Oregon, representing 150 mills, that we unanimously indorse house bill No. 2, known as the Chapin bill, now before the legislature of the state of Oregon, for adoption, as agreed upon by the joint committee of the house and senate; and be it further

Resolved, That it is the sense of this meeting that the Chapin railroad commission bill be treated as a purely business measure.

Whereas, the Southern Pacific company has again sounded the death knell of the lumber industry of Central Oregon, by advancing the freight rates on lumber from the Willamette Valley to California and bay points from \$5.17 per thousand to \$8.33 per thousand feet, thus again asserting the all-powerful and dominating influence of the Harriman system, from which the helpless shippers have no means of redress; and

Whereas, The people and industries of Oregon have already contributed enormous sums of money in excess of a fair and reasonable interest on the bonded indebtedness and watered stocks of the railroad in Oregon, which has made it possible, during the past six months, for Mr. Harriman to acquire over \$100,000,000 of stock in the Illinois Central Railroad, the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad, the New York Central Railroad, the Atchafalpa, the Chicago & Northwestern, the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul and the St. Joseph & Grand Island Railroads; and

Whereas, The larger portion of this great sum was wrong from the people of Oregon to further gratify the overweening ambition of Mr. Harriman, he now seeks to impose a still greater tax on the important industries tributary to his system. Therefore be it

Resolved, That it is the sense of this meeting that a committee be appointed to wait on the Harriman traffic officials and demand that the \$3.10 rate be maintained, the committee to report to the Commercial Club of Cottage Grove the result of its labors; and be it further

Resolved, That the terrible ambition of Mr. Harriman and the methods by which he puts that ambition into operation must be curbed.

To Organize Protective Body.

Before Mr. Beebe takes his office the appointment will have to be approved by the commissioner of the State Horticultural Society for this district. Mr. Beebe is one of Lane County's most prominent fruit growers and will no doubt fill the office acceptably to all concerned.

**COUNTY STOCK
INSPECTOR MAKES
FINAL REPORT**

Dr. Christie Shows What Work Has Been Done in Trying to Eradicate Diseases of Stock - Recommends Frequent Inspection of Dairies and Regulation of Slaughter Houses

Following is the annual report of Dr. J. Christie, county stock inspector, just filed with the county clerk: To the Honorable County Court in and for Lane County:

Gentlemen:—I have the honor to submit herewith my report of the work done by me as stock inspector of Lane county, for the year ending December 31, 1906. The reason that this report was not made earlier is, first, that I learned that my predecessors had not been required to make such report; and secondly, that upon the nominal salary attached to the office I could not, without personal loss, make a semi-annual inspection of all sheep in this immense county and the examination of infected stock when requested by ten persons, as contemplated by the statute.

During the past year while traveling on my professional duties I have from time to time examined bands of sheep, doing this without compensation other than my annual salary. I have issued certificates for twelve shipments of horses to California, or Washington. During the year there were shipped out of the county 3000 head of sheep. Six cows were destroyed for lampy jaw. I have tested two dairies for tuberculosis, with the result that five infected cows were killed. I have granted permits for the removal of three bands of sheep for dipping; have caused one horse to be killed for glanders; effected one quarantine for swine plague, and prescribed for 24 cases of mange in horses. I believe the stock of this county to be in fairly healthy condition at this time, with the exception that I am convinced that the sheep of the county to the extent of 60 per cent of their entire number, are affected with scabies. These ought to be treated as soon as possible and before hot weather sets in.

I have inspected with care most of the dairies selling products in the city of Eugene. I am fully aware of the difficulty of keeping barns and barn yards in reasonable sanitary condition during our long rainy season. But making all allowances for the difficulties to be overcome, I must say that as a general thing conditions are far from satisfactory. The danger of communication of disease through milk supply is very great. I would recommend that additional regulations be made both by the city and county authorities, looking to frequent and thorough inspection of dairies, barns and barn yards, and water supply for cattle, owned by those engaged in supplying dairy products to our people. I would also bring to your attention the matter of slaughter houses. I believe that these places are not kept in such a state of cleanness, inside or out, as a due regard for the health and comfort of the public requires. Some of these places are too near highways, and are thus a constant source of offense to the traveling public. I would respectfully sug-

gest that the public interest would be greatly helped if the individually-owned slaughter houses could be done away with, and one large, well-appointed building erected instead for the use of all desiring to slaughter animals for human food. By such union, without additional expense to any, better care and supervision could be had, and a convenient place afforded for the inspection of animals designed for human food before slaughter. Beyond question, during the past year meat has been sold in and about the city of Eugene, for human food, that came from animals seriously affected with disease. An inspection before and at slaughter would have caused the destruction of such meat.
