SUES FOR COMMISSION OF FIVE HUNDRED

J. J. Johnson Wants That Amount for Sale of Shares of Stock in Wildwood Lumber Company.

J. J. Johnson has begun suit in the circuit court for \$500 commission on the sale of 1992 shares of stock in the Wildwood Lumber Company, of Cottage Grove. The suit is against A. B. Wood, manager of the Oregon & Southern railroad, and interested in the Oregon Securities Co., the big concern operating in the Bohemia district. Johnson alleges in his complaint that in March, 1906, Wood engaged him to sell the shares of stock aforesaid, and that between March 1st and September 1st, 1906, he found a purchaser and the sale was made for \$12,000, but that the defendant had failed and neglected to pay the \$500 commission or any part thereof. U'Ren & Schaeffer are the attorneys for the plaintiff.

CITY COUNCIL HOLDS REGULAR MONTHLY SESSION

The regular meeting of the city council was held last night and routine business transacted.

The street committee reported the use of 5547 feet of lumber during the last month. Tiling culverts, 8 and 22 inches, respectively, were ordered put in under the crossing to be made on Columbia avenue over the railroad track. A bill for \$212.90 for work done on the city park was ordered paid, making a total of \$546.43 spent there. A statement of the amount of lumber obtained from the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company under contract was read, showing that about 2000 feet on ties had been overdrawn and there was still due 10,000 feet on the planking to be furnished.

The health committee reported that there was nothing in the way of contagious diseases. On the matter of the ordinance, the committee reported that the ordinance remains as it is, and that a statement be printed in the weekly papers showing the farmers that they are not prohibited from peddling meats from house to house, but that they are prohibited from setting up stands or using wagons as such.

New Policeman.
The mayor named J. O. Bristol for special police officer for Eugene, and especially for Fairmount, without stated salary, to be paid only for such work as he does.

Lands Damaged.
John Maughn complained that his lands are damaged by the washing of cans, etc., upon his property adjoining the city dumping ground by the floods. He presented a bill for \$50 damage. It was referred to the health committee and the city attorney.

Will Dedicate Street.
A petition from R. McMurphy, asking that Willamette street be extended from its northern extremity to the north line of his property, as he expects to dedicate Third street to the city so that property on the south

slope of the butte may be put on the market. A resolution was offered directing the city engineer to make the proper survey provided by the charter and report on same within 20 days. The petition was referred to the street committee.

No More Are Lights.
A petition for an are light at the intersection of Sixth and Lincoln streets was referred to the proper committee, where it will remain, as the city is not now in a position to arrange for any more lights.

Another meeting of the council will be held next Tuesday evening.
