VACATED

Sues His City, and Opposing Counsel, Accompanied by Judge Harris, Went to the Railroad Town Today to Look Over the Situation

Judge L. T. Harris, accompanied by Attorney J. M. Williams and Judge E. O. Potter, went to Junction this afternoon to look over the situation and view the grounds in the case of A. R. Martin vs. Junction City.

Mr. Martin asks for the vacation of certain streets and alleys in Junction and that city officials have refused to vacate, as requested, whereupon Mr. Martin brings suit asking the court to grant an order as prayed.

It was agreed upon by the interested parties that the counsel for both sides, with the presiding judge, should view the grounds before trial. Woodcock & Potter represent the plaintiff and Williams & Bean the defendants.

H. B. 107, Coffey—Providing increased penalties for persons convicted second and third times of a felony; providing a double sentence for second conviction and a life sentence for a third conviction. Ayes, 33; noes, 22; absent, 4.

H. B. 360, Ways and Means Committee—Appropriating \$25,000 for support of orphans, foundlings and wayward girls.

H. B. 207, Jackson—Fixing time within which bills of review may be brought.

H. B. 208, Campbell—Fixing at eight hours day's labor for mechanics in performance of labor for state or county. Ten voting no.

H. B. 220, Barrett of Washington—To prevent management of logging and mining camps from compelling men to board or trade at some particular boarding-house or store. Six voted no.

H. B. 118, Jackson—Appropriating \$100,000 for Armories for National Guard companies of the state.

H. B. 265, Pike—Authorizing State Land Board to sell certain lands devised to Soldier's Home at Roseburg for benefit of home.

H. B. 179, Vawter—Amending statute so that accused men on retrial of case shall be tried on the criminal information first preferred regardless of degree of crime reported in verdict of jury at first trial.

H. B. 186, Brown—Revoking will of unmarried person on occasion of subsequent marriage, regardless of their sex, present law applying only to wills executed by women.

H. B. 228, Hendrick—Including churches, box cars, steamboats and partially constructed buildings.

H. B. 179, Vawter—Amending law requiring husband and wife to testify the one against the other in certain criminal cases. Ayes, 31; noes, 25; absent, 2.

H. B. 321, Chase—For disposal of Coos land grant.

H. B. 59, Beveridge—Authorizing purchase of text books at expense of district at whose direction purchase

That the father of the said child is dead, and that the mother of the said child is not a resident of the state of Oregon, her whereabouts being to your petitioners unknown. That it is fit and proper that such adoption should take place, that said child has no guardian or next of kin in the state.

Wherefore we pray that this honorable Court will order that a copy of this petition and order thereon be published once each week for three successive weeks in a newspaper published in this county, according to law, that the court appoint a day for the hearing on this petition, and that at said hearing the court will order and decree that to all legal intents and purposes the said child is the child of your petitioners, and that the name of the said child be changed to Ora Newton Linn.
