

PRELIMINARY SURVEYS HAVE BEEN COMPLETED

Simon Klov Dahl, the engineer in charge of the Willamette Valley Company's surveys, yesterday completed the survey for the electric railway to Springfield. There are three distinct routes south of the river, one running around Juddkins' Point, to the Juddkins homestead, thence east of the Laurel Hill cemetery, thence north to the river bridge. Another route begins a few chains south of the Svarverud residence and thence through the south side of Hendricks' park, connecting with the Juddkins' Point route near the Laurel Hill cemetery. The other route is still further south of the one running through the park and goes through some pretty rough country on the Fairmount Heights, converging with the park route at Juddkins' Canon. Mr. Klov Dahl will begin the survey of the route up the McKenzie in a few days.

NO WOOD FAMINE

NEXT YEAR

A Guard reporter was in the hills south and east of town the first of the week and found the woods littered with cord wood. It is learned on good authority that nearly everybody who has timber within marketing distance of the city is cutting wood to haul to town next summer. Notwithstanding the unpleasant experience of many residents of Eugene this winter they should not be in a hurry to buy their next winter's wood too early, as there will be an abundance of fuel on the market next fall and it is safe to say that it can be had at reasonable prices.

railway-commissioners. The Oregonian says of the Republicans:

A number of men are being discussed, and some of them have been recommended to members of the appointing board. Among them are C. A. Westgate, chairman of the Republican state central committee; T. T. Geer, of Pendleton; T. C. Taylor, of Pendleton; J. M. Keen, of Medford; O. V. Hurt, of Corvallis; H. H. Hewitt, of Albany; W. A. Sears, of Portland; Colonel E. Hofer, of Salem; and D. E. Yoran, of Eugene.

(The Capital Journal editor sees no place on this or any other commission. He believes Oregon needs construction of new steam and electric roads far more than it does a railroad commission. The shippers demanded a demurrage law two years ago and still demand it. It would have answered every purpose. A railroad commission composed of political appointments will be worth less to Oregon, and that is all the people will get under the present law. No state having such a commission gets any real service from it.)

EUGENE-SPRINGFIELD ROAD WORK NEEDED

With all the travel between Eugene and Springfield a good smooth road should be maintained. In all the two miles from the university to the river bridge at Springfield, about the only decent piece of road is that just beyond Juddkins' Point where the flood swept it clean of mud and loose rock. There is an immense travel over this road—the greatest in the county why big odds—and much of the teaming is heavy, lumber, mining supplies and wheat product loads, giving a road its most severe test. There should be no low road in the middle, with wheel runs as with this about its entire length. Round it well up and you have a good road winter and summer.

With the first subsidence of the river so fine gravel may be obtained, this work should be done. It is better that there should be rain on it soon after it is spread and that it should have the softer bed of the rainy season. Then the gravel will not shift about and will soon make a smooth, hard road.
