

BITHULITHIC IS CHOICE OF COUNCILMEN

All Are of Opinion That This Material Is Kind for Eugene Street Pavement - Meeting to Decide Will Be Held Tuesday Evening

Mayor Wilkins and the members of the city council who went to Portland one day last week to examine the different kinds of pavement in use on the streets there, with a view of determining which is the best material to be placed on Eugene's streets, have returned. While there has been no public expression of the decision of the party, if there has been any made, it is understood that all are of the opinion that the bithulithic pavement is the best, and at the meeting of the council tomorrow night it will be decided to use that material. The bithulithic has been in use in Portland for the past four years and has given splendid satisfaction there. On one street where the traffic is heavier than on any other street in the city the bithulithic has stood for four years, without the expenditure of one cent for repairs, and it now appears to be as good as when it was put down.

It is said the cost of laying this pavement in Eugene will be less than in Portland because of the cheapness of crushed rock here, and it will no doubt last longer here than in Portland, for the reason that the traffic on the streets here is far less than on those of the metropolis.

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MAN POSED AS WOMAN

Paris Reports a Case the Antithesis of the Famous De Raylan Mystery.

WON ANOTHER MAN'S LOVE

Was Betrothed to Him When Suspicious of Supposed Girl's Sex Were Aroused and Masquerader Killed Himself.

A case directly antithetical to that of Nicholas de Raylan, who was found to be a woman, at Phenix, Ariz., is that of a young man who posed as a girl in Paris and actually became the affianced of a German schoolmaster.

The unnatural youth was of attractive appearance and evidently of good family. A slender waist, superb figure, fine complexion and luxuriant hair helped to complete the deception. He was known in Paris as Mlle. Alma de Parandeda, daughter of a count in the consular service at Rio Janeiro.

The Breslau teacher while visiting friends in Paris became acquainted with "Mlle. Alma," and love at first sight ensued. Then came the betrothal, and some months later the "bride to be" came to Breslau to be introduced to the pedagogues' relatives. That the couple were thoroughly devoted to each other was evident to all, and a happy union was predicted.

Some of the lady friends of the teacher became suspicious on account of
