

BALL AND CHAIN FOR COFFMAN AND PRITCHETT

Will Serve Twenty Days Each on the Streets for Being Drunk and Disorderly and for Being Out After Twelve O'Clock at Mid-night

"Shell" Coffman and Bill Pritchett, well-known characters about town, will be seen working on the streets for the next twenty days with ball and chain attached to their ankles. They were given that sentence by Police Judge Dorris this morning for being drunk and disorderly and violating the provisions of the new reform ordinance which prohibits the roaming of the streets after 12 o'clock at night without apparent business.

Coffman and Pritchett were arrested late last night by Officers Croner and Purdy, assisted by Fireman Chas. Croner, and taken to the city jail. When searched three empty whiskey flasks and nine eggs, the latter taken from Vincent's lunch counter, were found in their pockets. They were brought up in police court at 10 o'clock this morning and pleaded guilty. There was already a twenty-days' sentence hanging over Coffman's head, pending his good behavior, and the judge concluded that he could serve this out on the streets before the last charge would be brought against him. Pritchett was given twenty days. The ball and chain sentence was added, as it was feared that the prisoners would make an effort to get away if left unfettered. The shackles have been secured from Sheriff Flisk, and Coffman and Pritchett will begin wearing them tomorrow morning.

PUSHING OPERATIONS ON DRAIN-COOS BAY ROAD

Work on the Drain-Coos Bay railroad has been moving slowly this winter, but with the advent of spring the work will be pushed along faster. The S. P. Co. has commenced operations for the building of a wharf and warehouse near the Gardner Creamery for unloading and storing their supplies. Thirty thousand barrels of cement will be unloaded here as soon as the wharf is ready. The S. P. steamers will bring in these supplies. The work on the road is said to be very heavy on account of the tunneling and bridges. Ten bridges will be required between Drain and Elkton on Elk creek. It will take at least two years to complete the road this far.—Gardner Gazette.

AMUSEMENTS

"The Empire" comes to the Eugene theatre tonight. It is under the direction of Harry Askin, of the Grand opera house, Chicago, and has just completed the longest run ever known in that city, 350 performances, making new theatrical history.

Trouble seeks him forthwith, and he is kept busy untangling the amazing complications which arise until the end of the piece. Meanwhile a steady stream of dancing and music runs through the proceedings, illuminating the action and lightening the plot. This feature is provided by the famous "Empire" broilers, the roguish band of alluring sprites that made Chicago sit up and take notice all during their long sojourn there.

The cast which Manager Harry Askin has assembled for "The Empire" is one of the most competent that ever interpreted a musical comedy, and is headed by Fred Mace, the comedian, late of "Piff Paff Pout," whose work in "The Empire" has placed him in the front rank of funny men. Mr. Mace scores a big hit in his song, "How'd You Like to be the Umpire," and also in the duet with Daer of the prettiest sentimental ballad heard in years, "Cross Your Heart."

REV. NEWELL DWIGHT
HILLS IS COMING

The famous pastor of Henry Ward Beecher's famous Brooklyn church will lecture in Eugene next Saturday night, under the management of the University School of Music course.

Ten minutes' walk from the Fulton ferry and Brooklyn bridge stands the most famous church in America today. Striking is the contrast between the outer structure and its historic fame. For forty years this plain, simple building was the forum for the greatest pulpit and platform voice in the United States, and for sixty years the multitudes have thronged and crowded toward the old Puritan structure. Every Sunday as well as week day come flocking to this church visitors or pilgrims from every part of the land and from countries beyond the sea. A single week during the summer of the St. Louis exposition witnessed the presence of some two hundred prominent English travelers, including forty mayors and ex-mayors of various cities of Great Britain, with the primate of the Church of England, and other men known in the realm of education, finance and politics. When Mr. Beecher died D. Lyman Abbott was summoned to Plymouth. A deep, skilled and systematic thinker, conspicuous for his skill in handling the subtlest of great questions, with a clear and logical method, Dr. Abbott, a statesman and worthy of his position, resulted in all essential respects, and resulted in aiding good to the community.

Nearly eight years ago Newell Dwight Hills was called to Plymouth church. He first won the attention of the Christian world as the successor of Professor David Swing in Central Music Hall, Chicago. No other clergyman of Chicago ever had more ideal sympathetic conditions of

bringing each Sunday to the congregation a discourse that was always published the following day. And when Dr. Abbott resigned, to give himself to the Outlook, the Chicago preacher was immediately called to Brooklyn.

His success in Brooklyn was pronounced from the first hour. The men of Plymouth and the church itself were not less striking than Mr. Beecher himself. Men like Horace B. Claflin, Henry W. Sage, Dr. Rosister W. Raymond, S. V. White, Thos. G. Shearman, John W. Mason, Hayden W. Wheeler, Mortimer C. Ogden, General Horatio C. King, John T. Howard and a host of bankers, lawyers, merchants, scarcely less prominent, have lent fame to the church. No one can enter the old building without catching the contagion of enthusiasm. No words can describe the loyalty of its men to old Plymouth. In a single year the congregation once raised one hundred thousand dollars salary for Mr. Beecher, when he was in trouble and sore need. The church is an absolute democracy, known for its diversity in individual belief, for its philanthropic spirit, and its loyalty to its own multifarious Christian activities. When Mr. Beecher died, the membership was about 2500. When Mr. Abbott resigned the church had some 1800 members, despite all the removals incident to Mr. Beecher's death, and the fact that probably 1500 out of its audience of 2000 must ride to the church, while in Mr. Beecher's day most of the congregation were near enough to walk. The church is now growing constantly, and has gone up to 2150 members, with about 7500 people in its various clubs, schools and associations that look to Plymouth church as their church home.
