

DETERMINED TO PAVE DESPITE DISCOURAGEMENTS

Mayor and Council Will Go Ahead
With Preliminary Arrangements.
Engineer in Employ of Paving
Company Will Be Here Soon to
Make Estimate of Cost

Mayor Wilkin and the city council are determined not to be discouraged in their efforts to pave Eugene's business streets by the remonstrance of several property owners against the enterprise. The mayor, in conversation with a reporter today, stated that they intend to go ahead with the preliminary work, and he thinks that, despite the efforts of those to prevent the improvement from being made, at least one street, Willamette, will be paved before another winter's rain sets in.

One of the councilmen informed the reporter that within a few days an engineer of the company which lays the bituminous pavement will be here to view and survey the streets that are proposed to be paved, and an estimate of the cost of the work will be made. This work will be done at no expense to the city. Not till then will any one have any definite idea of the cost, and it appears to be premature to get up a remonstrance on account of the excessive cost of the work before the amount each property owner will have to pay is determined.

The mayor says he will be satisfied if only Willamette street is paved this year. After that, he thinks, the property owners on the side streets, with perhaps few exceptions, will be clamoring to have the improvement extended to their districts.

MISS CARSON DELIVERS ILLUSTRATED LECTURE

Professor Luella Clay Carson delivered this morning at the university assembly a very interesting illustrated lecture on the English universities of Oxford and Cambridge, their customs and work. The photographs thrown on the screen added very much to the interest, for most of the buildings and surroundings were shown to the two hundred or more people who were present.

Professor Carson began with Cambridge, giving an introduction to the circumstances of the interest of this country in Oxford owing to the Rhodes scholarships, and after a very complete survey of the school, interspersed by splendid pieces of description, postponed the lecture on Oxford until next Wednesday, as the time was not at the speaker's command to treat the last part of the subject properly.

Class Meets for Track.
The sophomore class of the university met last night and completed plans for the sophomore-freshman track meet which will be pulled off here March 2. D. W. Reed, who is registered from Portland, was elected captain, and McEwen, another prominent sophomore, was elected manager to assist the track team manager in making arrangements for the event. The event is considered quite important, and very likely a cup of some sort will be put up as a trophy.

FRUIT TREE SPRAYING SEASON HERE AGAIN

County Fruit Inspector J. Beebe desires the Guard to call the attention of orchardists and townspeople as well to the necessity and urgency of spraying their fruit trees. Now until the leaves start is the time to spray.

If you wish to do the work yourself here is the formula for the best recommended solution: Lime, 10 pounds; sulphur, 10 pounds; salt, 5 pounds. Slake the lime, add sulphur, cover with water and boil briskly for an hour or longer. Add the salt and boil 20 minutes longer, until the mixture is a deep red, with little free sulphur on the surface. Add water to make thirty gallons. Apply to the tree with considerable force through a coarse nozzle while still warm.

Don't spray while the trees are damp with rain or fog. The best results are obtained by not commencing before the middle of the forenoon and if the orchardist has time, not until after noon.
