### NOW FILING ON FORTY-ACRE TIMBER CLAIMS

Entrymen No Longer Able to Find Good 160-Acre Tracts and Smaller Tracts Eagerly Taken Up. Can File on But One Tract Whether Large or Small

The rush for timber claims has become so great in this section of the state that many people are now using their timber right of entry to secure 40-acre claims. The law gives every person the right to take 160 acres, but having once filed on a smaller amount he can then take no more. The entrymen realize this, but since timberland values have risen so remarkably in the past few months they are content to take a vacant 40 acres if it is well timbered. By the selections of those who filed on timber claims in the past few years, many vacant 40-acre tracts have been left isolated in Lane county, as well as elsewhere. These cannot be joined together for entries, for the law provides that all of the land in each filing must be contiguous. These vacant forties have been ignored until the past few weeks, but now people who fear they will never have an opportunity to secure a 160-acre claim have been making arrangements to get the smaller ones. In the past there have been a number of filings on 80-acre tracts, but it was not until very lately that any forties were taken. The great rise in the price of timberland has been the principal cause of the willingness of people to use their timber right on one-fourth of the amount to which the law allows them. Prices in this part of the state have literally soared the past few months. But the fear that congress may abolish all timber and stone entries has probably had something to do with the filings, too.

### SURVEYORS GO TO SACRAMENTO COUNTRY

Three or four of the surveyors who have been working on the Oregon Eastern line, or the Natron extension of the Southern Pacific in the Cascade Mountains in the eastern part of this county, arrived here yesterday and will be followed Friday by twenty or thirty more. The party will leave in a few days for the Sacramento valley, where they will be employed in surveying a new line which the company intends to build. The members of this party state that the work of locating the line across the mountains is still progressing and their leaving has no effect, as there are several other crews at work.

### OREGON NEWS

Medford has just sold \$45,000 of 5 per cent bonds to Morris Bros., of Portland, for \$46,960.

There are four million feet of logs in the pond of the sawmill at Crawfordville, enough for six months' sawing.

Editor Bennett, of Rabbitville fame, has sold his interest in the Optimist at The Dalles, and has returned to Irrigon, which made him famous, and hereafter his Rabbitville letters will be irrigated.

Jos. Whitney, an old gentleman 70 years of age, was killed by the cars at Woodburn. He attempted to cross the track ahead of a train when he was struck, being carried some distance, receiving injuries that resulted in his death.

Junction is about to stop cows running in its streets, an ordinance having been drafted for that purpose. No city can expect to prosper that allows its lawns and streets to be made cow pastures.

The Horticultural Society again met this afternoon, and after some society business heard the proposition of Allen G. Metcalf, of Eugene, to establish a cannery of sufficient size to attend to all offerings of strawberries, raspberries, Royal Ann cherries, Bartlett pears and other fruits, for five years at prevailing prices in other cannery towns, the \$1500 bonus to remain as lien for three years for satisfactory performance. Also one from Lasselle Bros. for a 6000-a-day canning establishment, for fruits and eventually vegetables, but without the lien proposition.—Albany Democrat.
