They are Vern Apperson and Curtis Church, young men 15 or 16 years of age, and who have been skating only during the last two or three years. They gave an exhibition at the Underwood skating rink last night before a large audience.

Several features were on the program for the evening, the first being skating races. In the potato race Roy Pope was first and Lucie Miller second. In the obstacle race that followed Louis Belshaw came out first and Roy Pope second. Vern Apperson then appeared in his fancy skating. While he was doing his stunts to the admiration of the crowd, Curtis Church appeared dressed as "Uncle Josh," who was just learning to skate. After falling all over himself a few times he joined Apperson and the two together did some very clever waltzing and two-stepping. Next Apperson did the chair-jumping act, and after this was done the apparatus for the "leap for life" was placed in position. The young man did the stunt successfully, and after alighting on the floor leaped over six chairs amid great applause. Next came the thrilling "leap the gap" by Church. The first trial was only partially successful, he failing to clear one of the barrels on the floor, but the second time he made the gap and cleared both barrels neatly and was rewarded with cheers and applause.

CONGRESS WORKS ON BIRTHDAY OF WASHINGTON

Washington, Feb. 22.—The senate began its session today by commemorating the memory of George Washington, whose farewell address was read by Senator Burkett, of Nebraska. The house did not observe the anniversary beyond a reference to it in the prayer of the chaplain.

The house agreed to the conference report in the omnibus lighthouse bill. The senate has already accepted it and the bill goes to the president.

Signed by President.
The president has signed the diplomatic and consular appropriation bill, the first of the regular supply measures acted on by congress.

To Arbitrate Strikes.
The house committee on interstate and foreign commerce decided today to favorably report the Townsend bill, providing for the appointment of a commission by the president to arbitrate labor troubles which threaten interstate commerce. The commission will be under the department of commerce and labor.

Will Postpone Action.
The senate committee on Pacific railroads today failed to get a quorum to consider Heyburn's resolution directing the committee to make an investigation into the recent reorganization of the Northern Pacific. The opinion of the members present was that the matter should be postponed until the next session.

To Prohibit Polygamy.
A resolution proposing a constitutional amendment to prohibit polygamy, offered by Senator Dubois, was today sent to the judiciary committee for an investigation of the subject.

Alaska Land Districts.
The senate committee on territories ordered favorably reported the bill to create two additional land districts in Alaska, one at Nome and one at Fairbanks.

Oregon's Memorial.
Fulton presented the memorial from the Oregon legislature favoring the election of United States senators by direct vote of the people.
