

PAVEMENT WILL COST \$4.50 PER FRONT FOOT

At yesterday evening's council meeting Mr. Shannon, representing the Warren Construction Company, gave figures on the cost of the proposed street pavement with bituminous material. With the sidewalks widened two feet on each side of the street and seven feet of the pavement to be paid for by the street railway company, the approximate cost will be \$4.50 per front foot, with a four-inch base of crushed rock. The matter was referred to the city engineer, who will take the measurements of Willamette street and figure out the exact cost. It is probable that the work can be done more cheaply than the estimate given by Mr. Shannon, as the gravel on the street can be used in many places as a base instead of crushed rock. The gravel is from 12 to 20 inches deep, and is as solid as any crushed rock can be made.

DEATH OF MRS. WILL CRAIG AT ELLENSBURG

Mrs. Will Craig, formerly of Eugene, died at the home of her husband's parents at Ellensburg, Wash., January 19, of tuberculosis. The news of her death has just been received by a friend of hers in the Milton, Or., Eagle of recent date. The Eagle says:

"About six weeks ago Mrs. Craig went to Ellensburg, thinking a change would benefit her, but all that medical skill and loving hands could do proved of no avail.

"Besides her husband she leaves a mother, Mrs. Thomas Bradley, of Beaverton, Or.; a sister, Mrs. R. E. Frazier, of Walla Walla, and another sister, Mrs. James Cannane, of Milton, a stepfather and two half brothers of Beaverton, Or.

"The deceased was born at Portland, Or., October 30, 1873, and lived in that vicinity until her marriage on Christmas day, 1894. In company with her husband she went to Hillsboro, lived there one year, then moved to Eugene, where they remained until 1902, when they removed to North Yakima for a short time, and have since resided in Milton.

"She was converted at the age of 15 years and united with the Methodist Episcopal church, and had ever since been a devout Christian. She belonged to the Rebekah lodge and was a valued member, ever striving to live up to the principles taught by the order.

"To know her was to love her, and her many acts of kindness will ever remain fresh in the hearts of those whose good fortune it was to be numbered among her friends."
