BINGHAM'S NEW FOREST FIRE LAW

Following are the essential sections of Senator Bingham's bill, which was enacted into a law by the late legislature. It provides for a state board of forestry and for better regulations for the prevention of forest fires:

Section 1. There shall be a State Board of Forestry, consisting of the Governor, Secretary of State, the State Fish and Game Warden, the member of the Oregon Agricultural college who has charge of its work, and three electors of the state of Oregon to be appointed by the Governor from and upon the authoritative recommendation of the Lumber Manufacturers' Association of Oregon, Oregon Forestry Association and the United States Forest Service, each to name and select one of such electors. In the absence of such recommendation the governor shall nevertheless appoint such electors. The members of said board will receive no compensation for their services thereon. The said board shall meet at the call of the governor as soon as convenient after appointment, and shall organize by the election of a chairman and secretary. A majority of said board shall constitute a quorum. Said board shall meet at any convenient place in the state at the call of the chairman, who shall call a meeting whenever requested to by a majority of the board.

Section 2. Under such general policy as to qualifications, numbers and localities as the state Board of Forestry shall deem wise, it may appoint suitable and proper citizens State Fire Wardens, who shall have all the powers given to the wardens under this act, who will serve without compensation. The board shall appoint any person as fire warden who shall be recommended by property owners or counties, provided that such property owners or counties shall pay such fire warden his compensation to be agreed upon. The president of the board shall appoint the last above named wardens immediately when requested to do so. State and county officials whose duties make their ex-officio services as fire wardens especially desirable as a convenience to the public, shall accept appointments as such when formally requested by the State Board of Forestry. Upon the recommendation of the Federal Forest Supervisor, the board may appoint resident officers of the national forest reserves, who shall be ex-officio fire wardens.

Section 3. During the period between June 1 and October 1, which is hereby designated the close season, it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to set on fire or cause to be set on fire, any slashing, chopping, wood land or brush land, either his or their own, or the property of another, without written or printed permission from a state fire warden, and compliance with the terms thereof. This restriction shall not apply to the burning of log piles, stumps or brush heaps, in small quantities, at a safe distance from other inflammable material, and under adequate precautions and personal control, and in accordance with regulations adopted by said board; but if any such burning without permission shall result in the escape of fire, and injury to the property of another, this shall be held prima facie evidence that such burning was not safe, and was a violation of this section. Violations of these provisions shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars, nor more than five hundred (\$500.00) dollars, or by imprisonment of not less than ten days nor more than three months. Permits to burn, as provided by this section, may be issued by any state fire warden, and shall contain such restrictions as to time of burning, and precaution to be taken, as shall be fixed by the state board of forestry, or left by said board to the discretion of fire wardens. Any fire warden shall have the right to refuse, revoke or postpone permits when it is clearly necessary for public safety. Any applicant dissatisfied with the decision of a state fire warden shall have the right to appeal to the state board of forestry. Any permit obtained through willful misrepresentation shall be invalid and give no exemption from liability of any kind.

Section 4. Any person who sets on fire or causes to be set on fire any woods, brush, grass, grain, stubble or other material being or growing on any lands not his own, without permission from the owner, or who willfully or negligently allows fire to escape from his own land, or anyone who accidentally sets a fire on his own land or another's and allows it to escape from his control without extinguishing it, or using every effort to

do so, shall be punished by a fine of not less than fifty (\$50) nor more than one thousand (\$1000) dollars, or imprisonment for not less than one month, nor more than one year; provided that it shall be lawful to build in a careful manner, campfires on any unenclosed lands, the owner of which has not forbidden such campfires thereon by personal notice or by posting such prohibition in conspicuous places or otherwise, if before departing from the place where such campfire has been built, the builder of such campfire totally extinguishes the same; and provided, further, that nothing in this section shall apply to the setting of a back fire, in good faith, to prevent the progress of a fire then burning.

Section 7. Any person who builds a campfire upon lands within this state not his own, without clearing the ground immediately around it free from material which will carry fire, or who leaves thereon a campfire burning and unattended, or who permits a campfire to spread thereon, or who uses in any firearms discharged thereon other than incombustible gun wadding, shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars nor more than five hundred (\$500) dollars, and upon refusal or neglect to pay the fine and costs imposed shall be imprisoned for a period not to exceed one day for every two dollars thereof, or may be subject to both such fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the court.

Section 8. From June first to October first of each year it shall be unlawful for person, firm or corporation to use any locomotive, logging engine, portable engine, traction engine or stationary engine using fuel other than oil in or near forest or brush land, which is not provided with an adequate spark arrester kept in constant use and repair. Any person, firm or corporation who shall fail to provide and use such spark arrester shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall pay a fine for each engine or locomotive without such spark arrester of not less than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars nor more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars, and shall be enjoined from further use of such locomotive or engine until such spark arrester is provided. Escape of fire from any engine shall be prima facie evidence that such appliance has not been adequately maintained in compliance with this section.

Section 9. All persons, firms or corporations engaged in logging or permitting logging upon their lands, shall each year burn their annual slashings, by which is meant the tops and debris or inflammable refuse left after lumbering, that will carry fire or cause it to spread, at such time and in such manner and with such provision of help as will confine the fire to their own lands; provided that the state board of forestry may, upon request by such or adjoining, extend or restrict the limit of time in which such burning shall be done in cases where it deems that public safety so requires. All persons, firms or corporations shall procure a permit from a state fire warden to do such burning in accordance with section 5 of this act. Any person, firm or corporation neglecting or refusing to conform with these provisions shall be punished by a fine of not less than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars nor more than one thousand (\$1000) dollars.

Section 10. Any person, firm or corporation operating a railroad within this state shall annually, or when so directed by the state board of forestry, and in a manner and to an extent directed by said board, destroy or remove all inflammable material from the right-of-way of such railroad, and upon neglect or refusal to do such clearing shall be punished by a fine of not less than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars nor more than one thousand (\$1000) dollars.

Section 11. Any person who shall unlawfully or maliciously set fire to any woods, forest, timber, brush or other vegetable matter whatever with the intent that the property of another shall be injured thereby, shall be guilty of felony, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by imprisonment in the state penitentiary for not less than one nor more than ten years.

Section 12. In addition to the penalties provided in this act, the United States, state, county or private owner whose property is injured, destroyed by such fires, may recover in a civil action the full amount of damages suffered if the fires occurred through willfulness, malice or negligence, as determined by the value of the property injured or destroyed, and the detriment to the land and vegetation thereof.

The second half opened by the club boys caging two baskets in succession, but the university in a short while again had the lead. Then came some of the fastest basketball seen here for many a day, for though the 'varsity piled up most of the baskets and had the best of the contest, their smaller opponents never gave up for an instant and fought like fiends with now and then a flash of pretty team work.

The university has two more games to play this season, the first one of which will be Saturday night with the champions of the world, known as the Crescent five, from Chicago.

Some sort of preliminary contest will be arranged so as to make the evening full of entertainment.

Section 14. That chapter two hundred and twenty-seven (227), general laws of Oregon, session 1905, and all other acts or parts of acts in conflict with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed.

Clatsop and Tillamook counties are exempt from operation of section 9.
