IMPROVEMENTS PLANNED AT THE UNIVERSITY

Correspondence Department Will Be Added and Courses Given By Mail - New Engineering Building and Additional Girls' Dormitory to Be Built

The faculty of the university is planning to make many important extensions in the next two or three years, one of the most novel of which will be the correspondence department along the lines of the modern correspondence school to some extent. Many of the departments of the university are so arranged that with but little expense correspondence courses can be included so that hundreds of people in the state who desire a higher education along various lines, and yet cannot afford to attend an institution or leave their positions, may have their desires gratified. Just the exact limits that will be set to the new courses has not been decided definitely, as it is the intention if President Campbell to have the system working by next year, further details will have to be determined very soon. The idea behind the movement in the minds of the faculty and the president is to reach as many people as possible in the state, so that the money that the state invests in the university may bring the greatest possible results.

New Buildings. The next two years to the students of the university seem very bright, for a great many additions will be made to the school, especially in the engineering and technical departments, as physics, biology, chemistry and so on. It is quite certain that a new engineering building will be constructed within a year, and that a great deal of additional equipment will be provided. President Campbell wants the departments in engineering to be made as strong as possible, since he feels that what the state needs is men with a good technical education to further its development.

Beyond a doubt another girls' dormitory will be erected within the next two years. Many other improvements will also be made, the exact nature of which will not be given out until the board of regents meets and determines and selects.

CHAMBERLAIN SCORES SPEAKER DAVEY HARD

(Continued from Page 1)

disposed of. I have not examined the house journal, but I assume it will speak the truth, and, if it does, it will appear that the distinguished speaker declared on the evening of the 22d of February, 1907, that the bill had passed, when, in fact, it had not passed. That the next morning when the house convened he stated that he had announced the bill as passed the evening before, when in fact it had not passed, and then, of his own motion, he ordered the roll called for the purpose of checking the negative votes, no member answering his name until that of King, of Malheur, was reached. Mr. King, when his name was called, changed his vote of "no," cast the evening before, to "yes," and without proceeding further down the roll, the speaker declared the bill passed a second time. I am of the opinion that these irregularities would invalidate the measure, even if it were not vetoed by me. The journal of the house will only show the ultimate facts, however, and will not show the speeches that were made by the speaker and others. These, which are contemporaneous history, must be gathered from other sources, and as a part of that contemporaneous history I quote from a paper published in the Capital City, and which is edited by the distinguished speaker, who presided on both occasions referred to. I think it but fair to assume that what is there stated would not have been published unless true, and I quote:

A True Report. "When the vote was finished on the bill just before adjournment, there were still two lacking of the required number.

"Only two more needed," shouted Davey as he held his gavel suspended, and then Bayer changed his vote from no to yes.

"Only one more vote needed now," said Davey, and Reynolds, of Marion, changed his vote, presumably carrying the bill. After the house had adjourned it was discovered that still one vote was lacking, as stated in the Statesman yesterday morning, and it was thought for a time that the bill would be defeated, but yesterday morning the question was resumed again, and, without a new vote being taken, Davey allowed King to change his vote from no to yes, and the Drain and Monmouth schools were given a new lease of life."

"It will thus be seen that the proceedings of the house partook somewhat of an auction sale, and the rights of the people struck off under the hammer to those producing the greatest number of votes.

Unlawful Precedent. "There is certainly no precedent for this in Oregon, and I know of no parallel in history, except in that instanced by Gibbon in his 'Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire,' where the Praetorian guards, grown insolent with excess of military license, ran out upon the ramparts, proclaimed the Roman world for sale and struck off the right and privilege of presiding over the destinies of a decadent people at public auction to the highest bidder.

"I cannot give my assent or approval to any law, whether passed in the interest of an educational institution or for any other purpose, which so flagrantly violates the rights of the people, and shows such contempt and disregard for their interest. There is no safety for government in state or nation if such a precedent is to remain established for the guidance of generations yet unborn."

A strike of \$9,000 railroad employees is imminent in the West. It will be left to a vote of the men.
