RAY ELLIS PLEADS GUILTY TO INCEST CHARGE

Will Be Sentenced Tomorrow Morning at Ten O'Clock - Liquor Cases Again Continued - Jury Awards Scharen Brothers Damages for Killing of Cattle

The several cases in the circuit court against Eugene, Springfield and Florence men, charged with violating the local option law by the alleged sale of liquor, which have gone through several terms, have again been continued to await the decision of the supreme court on one of the cases that was appealed from the circuit court.

Ellis Pleads Guilty.
Raymond Ellis, the man charged with the crime of incest, was arraigned in court yesterday afternoon and the time for entering a plea was set for 10 o'clock this morning. At that hour he appeared and pleaded guilty. He will be sentenced Friday morning at 10 o'clock.

Scharen Bros. Get Verdict.
The jury in the case of the Scharen Brothers, of Creswell, against the Southern Pacific company, for damages for the killing of several head of cattle by one of the company's gravel trains last fall, returned a verdict last night, awarding the plaintiffs \$225.

Verdict for Smith.
Late yesterday afternoon the case of E. C. Smith vs. J. I. Beers, to recover money, came up and the following jury was chosen: E. S. Parks, J. W. Stone, J. A. Blakely, J. M. Cornelius, Thos. Calvert, H. W. Dunn, L. Y. Congdon, P. M. McPherson, F. S. Tingley, M. L. Hammit, Alfred Minor and T. J. Blakely. This forenoon at 11 o'clock they returned a verdict for the plaintiff in the sum of \$353, with \$10 attorney's fees.

WILL WORK GRAVEL BAR AGAIN THIS SUMMER

Southern Pacific Company Said to Be Preparing to Reconstruct Trestle Across River - Bar Filled in During High Water in February. May Also Work Lower Bar

The Guard has learned from a reliable authority that the Southern Pacific Company intends to again work the gravel bar across the river from the old tannery this summer and that just as soon as all danger from high water is over a crew will be here to put in the trestle to span the river. The high water of last month caused the bar to fill in again, and the gravel there now is said to be of better quality than before. There is not so much sand as before and the quantity is nearly as great as formerly. It is probable that the company will also work the bar a few hundred yards below this one. It can be reached comparatively easily, and there is nearly as much gravel there as at the upper bar.

The working of the bar by the company last year was the means of establishing headquarters here for several train crews besides the crews in the pit, altogether a hundred or more men, and it is presumed that as many or more will be here again this year.

It is reported that the company has loaded two cars of materials for the trestle, and that they will be here in a short time.

MRS. ELLIS LECTURES ON PHRENOLOGY
