The body of W. F. Miles, an old man who was drowned in the Siuslaw river in the vicinity of Acme early Sunday morning, was shipped on the flyer last night to Chehalis for burial. The body arrived here last evening and was prepared for shipment by Gordon, the undertaker. Last Saturday Miles, who was a bachelor, aged 66 years, and living alone, rowed from his home above Acme to Florence to attend a meeting of the Masonic lodge, of which he was a member. He started home about midnight and was never seen alive after that. Sunday morning an Indian saw his upturned boat in the river and notified the people living in that vicinity. After a short search the body of the unfortunate man was found. The man has an uncle in Chehalis, where the body will be buried, and a sister in New York state.

ASKS FOR DIVORGE ON CRUELTY GROUNDS

Mrs. Nannie Davis has instituted suit in the circuit court against Monroe Davis for divorce and the custody of their two children, Cleo, aged six years, and Rosalie, four years. She alleges in her complaint, filed this morning, that they were married in Douglas county on August 22, 1900. Cruel and inhuman treatment is the ground upon which she seeks to be legally separated from her husband, alleging that he has called her vile names, applied obscene epithets to her, struck her and kicked her and falsely accused her of having intimate relations with other men. She asks the court to allow her to keep and care for the two children. Co-show & Rice, of Roseburg, are her attorneys in the case.

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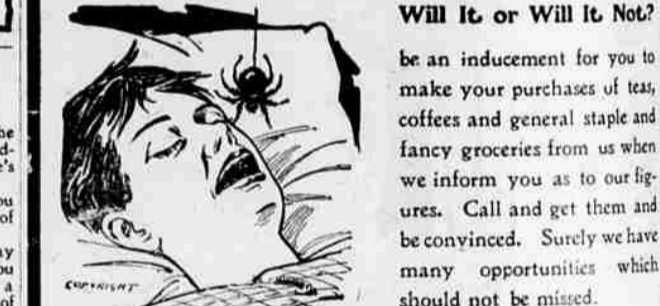
