ROSEBURG LAND DISTRICT IS VERY LARGELY AFFECTED

The Review today presents its readers with the first authentic information regarding the lands in the Roseburg district embraced in President Roosevelt's recent order, enlarging or creating 32 forest reserves. For this information we are indebted to Frank E. Alley, the well known land attorney of this city, who on Wednesday sent a telegram from Portland to Washington, D. C., ascertaining just what townships in this district were affected by the order. They are as follows:

Townships 14 to 30, both inclusive, in ranges 9, 10 and 11, and parts of ranges 8, 12 and 13 west.

Townships 29 to 39, both inclusive, in ranges 13 and 14.

Townships 32 to 41, both inclusive, in ranges 11 and 12, and parts of ranges 10 and 13.

Also a large number of fractional townships, which, together with the above described land, lie south and west of the Willamette Meridian.

So far the Roseburg land office has received no official information as to the withdrawal of these lands, which comprise approximately 124 townships. About one-half of the land is covered by entries, but these will not be affected by the order. The widely circulated report that the withdrawal embraced all of the remaining unappropriated land in the district is erroneous. While it is impossible to give exact figures in the absence of official information, a rough estimate advanced is that there remains for entry one-half of the unappropriated area that existed prior to this latest withdrawal.—Roseburg Review.

HERMANN TOLD

MELORUM TO BUY

Washington, March 7.—When the trial of Blinger Hermann, former commissioner of the general land office, was resumed yesterday, Mr. Melorum, former surveyor-general of Oregon, and who now stands convicted of conspiracy in land frauds in that state, was cross-examined by Attorney Worthington, of the defense. He said that pressure had been brought to bear on him in 1904 in Oregon by Heney and Burns, government attorneys, who told him that if he did not tell what he knew about Hermann he would get a severe jail sentence. After stating that he had said at the time that he knew nothing that would incriminate Hermann, he replied to a similar question, which follows:

"I think I told them to go to —." The witness said that Mr. Hermann, while commissioner, had told him that it would be a good thing to buy up school land in a certain section of Oregon, as the section was to be included in a forest reserve. While Mr. Hermann did not say so, he understood that profit could be made in this transaction by selling the lands to the government or exchanging them for better lands out there.

Emmett Callahan, an attorney of Baker City, Or., who testified for the government last week that he visited Mr. Hermann at the land office in November, 1902, at which time he indicated Mr. Hermann was aiding Mr. May and others in Oregon, who were endeavoring to get school lands in that state included in the forest reserves, was cross-examined by Attorney Worthington. Mr. Callahan said that the secretary of the interior seemed very bitter against Mr. Hermann at the time of his visit here in 1902.
