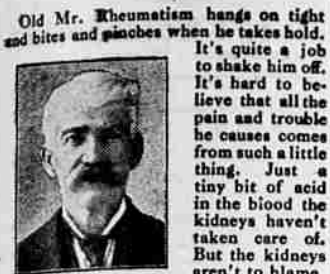

TWO BIG DEALS MADE IN TIMBER

The largest deal in timber lands that has been thus far consummated in Oregon was closed in this city yesterday, when W. C. McClure, of Salsaw, Mich., took over 18,000 acres in Polk and Lincoln counties, for \$900,000. The sellers were Cobb & Muehl, also of Michigan, says Thursday's Portland Telegram.

The tract in question is covered with some of the best yellow fir in the Northwest, according to timber men conversant with the locality. Much of it is contiguous to the Siletz reservation, and has been in the hands of dealers several years.

This timber, although contiguous to several good logging streams, is to be "logged off" by the aid of railroads. Most of the logs will ultimately find their way into Portland by way of the new road running west from Hillsboro.

Salsaw Deal.
Another big deal was closed yesterday when 15,000 acres along the Salsaw river were sold to H. N. Hovey and M. B. Starrett, of Detroit, Michigan. This tract was mostly all in the hands of settlers who had recently proved up. These entrymen received from \$1500 to \$1000 a claim for their lands. The location is remote from the railroad, and will probably be held by the present owners for an advance, which timber men predict will take place within a few years.

(Deeds for lands in the Salsaw deal have been filed with the Lane county clerk for record by Hovey and Starrett from time to time during the last few months, as noted by the Guard at the time they were filed.)

KISSINGER'S STORY BEING INVESTIGATED

The federal authorities are investigating the testimony given yesterday by C. M. Kissinger, a well-known Eugene lawyer, before United States Commissioner E. D. McKee, in the preliminary hearing in the case of Hugh L. Adkins, and it is said the matter may be laid before the next federal grand jury, says the Portland Telegram.

Kissinger's story was taken down by

Miss Vivian Flexner, stenographer in the United States attorney's office, a thing very unusual in preliminary hearings. The question under investigation is whether Kissinger told the truth when he testified that he had never said to Mesdames Burns and Potter, former landladies of Adkins, that Adkins was a secret service man.

It is known that Assistant United States Attorney Cole is investigating the matter, and that he had Kissinger's testimony reduced to writing.

NEWS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF OREGON

The faculty of the university last night chose of the three candidates from the school for the Rhodes scholarship Wistar Johnson to go before the state committee at Albany next Saturday as the candidate of the university. One other candidate tried for the scholarship. He is E. J. Welens, of Willamette University. In making the final choice the student's athletic ability, oratorical and general student body career each count as much as the record of class work. Johnson is the son of the first president of the university, and has always been very popular.

NEW SPECIES OF BIRD SEEN HERE

Mountain, or Alaska Robin, Numerous in the Far North, Invades Lane County.

Lane county has been invaded during the last two years by a new species of bird, the "Mountain," or "Alaskan" robin. The bird was formerly found north of here, and not usually in this state, but lately there seems to have been a veritable emigration to this section. While found in the mountains usually they are seen once in a while in the valleys, and this winter three or four have been making the campus of the university their home.

In form the little creature is slightly smaller, but in outline follows the build of the common robin, except that it never becomes puffy and thick, as the other robin does, with age and good living. The back of the bird is much the same shade as its cousin, but along the wings there is a mottled strip of dark and light spots or dashes. Some observers say that around the neck there is a small black circle. Usually the bird is very wild, but those on the campus seem exceptionally tame.
