

RULES OF OREGON RAILROAD COMMISSION

The following are the permanent rules adopted relative to complaints and investigations established by the new Oregon board of railroad commissioners:

1. All complaints and applications to have hearings before the railroad commission upon any question arising under the law creating said commission shall be in writing, and no verbal complaint or application will be entertained by the commission.

2. Such complaints shall contain a brief statement of the subject matter of complaint or application, and be signed by the complainants or applicants; but technical pleading will not be required. It must be delivered to the commission through the secretary, or to any member of the commission by the complainant or applicant, his agent or attorney, or it may be sent to the commission through the mails.

3. If such complaint or application contains matters which, in the judgment of the commission, require investigation, the secretary shall file the same by placing his file mark thereon with the proper number and enter the same on the docket.

4. Before causing notice of the time and place of hearing to be issued to the party complained of as provided in section 25 of the act creating the commission, the commission may notify the party against whom the complaint is made of the nature of such complaint and the party making the same, in order that the cause of the complaint may be removed or remedied without incurring the expense of a formal trial or hearing before the commission.

5. The party making complaint shall be designated "plaintiff," and the party against whom the complaint is made shall be designated "defendant." If the application be "ex parte," the case shall be so styled with the name of the applicant.

6. The answer shall be in writing, stating and setting forth in plain and concise language the reason the prayer of the complaint should not be allowed, and must be filed with the commission within ten days of the service of notice of the making of complaint, as provided in section 28 of the act creating the commission, unless a different time shall be prescribed.

For good cause shown the commission may allow answer to be filed after the expiration of the time aforesaid, but the same shall not operate to delay the hearing of the complaint.

7. Amendments may be allowed by the commission, in its discretion, to any complaint, petition, answer or pleading in any proceeding before it.

8. Extensions of time may be granted by the commission, in its discretion, in which to plead or file any paper in any proceeding, upon application therefor and cause shown.

8. Hypothetical questions will not be answered, and requests for rulings in advance of the happening of the events on which predicated, will ordinarily be denied.

SUPREME COURT DECIDES APPEAL AGAINST ODELL

Salem, Or., March 12.—In affirming the decision of Judge Burnett, of the circuit court for Marion county, in the case of W. B. Morse, respondent, vs. W. H. Odell, appellant, the supreme court has thrown down the bars for an almost endless chain of cases of a similar nature, which, if the claims and allegations are true, will force Odell to liquidate more than a score of claims for a refund of money paid on state base lands furnished the applicants by Odell, while acting as state agent, and which later proved invalid for diverse reasons.

The case was brought by Morse, a physician of this city, to recover \$540, which he had paid Odell to supply him with 640 acres of base lands for the selection of an equal area of other state real estate. The land was picked out, but the selection was rejected by the interior department of the United States on the ground that the state had failed to prove the mineral character of the base, and that no title had ever been obtained to the sale by any of the parties concerned.

QUARTER MILLION FROM EUGENE CITY

H.
