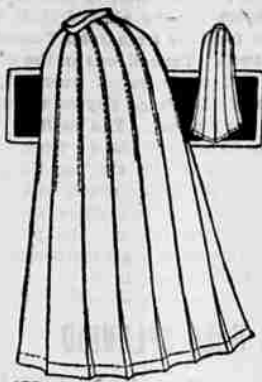

DR. SCHAFER SPEAKS ON JESSE APPLIGATE

The assembly address at the university this morning was one of the best for some time. Dr. Schafer, using as his subject "Jesse Appligate, a Prince of Pioneers," taking up the whole hour with an excellent outline and description of Jesse Appligate, the man who really created the provisional government for Oregon, and led the thousand Americans across the plains in 1843 who determined the fate of the Oregon country in the joint settlement between the United States and Great Britain some time later.

The stereopticon view of the only picture of Appligate, which was finished from memory only five weeks ago, was shown on the screen also. The famous pioneer, who framed so many early laws of Oregon, was always averse to being pictured, either by photographers or cartoonists, and guarded himself that not once was a likeness caught during his lifetime except in the eyes of his friends and acquaintances.

Professor Schafer began with the ancestors of the well-known pioneer, and told what little was known of them, and then traced his career from St. Louis, where he was in the law office of Edward Bates, attorney-general under Lincoln, across the Rocky Mountains into Oregon, and then followed with an outline of his political life here.

U'Ren Next Wednesday.
W. S. U'Ren, of Oregon City, and father of the initiative and referendum laws of Oregon, will speak next Wednesday at the assembly on "Recent Movements of Legislation."
