DAN KELLY TRAINING FOR SEATTLE MEET

Dan Kelly is training and getting into form very rapidly for the Seattle indoor meet March 29. So far he, with all the rest of the track aspirants, has been trying to get the form of the various events, but the other night Dan tried a jump that looked very long to his admirers here. While Hayward discourages all competition or attempts to make records so early in the season, one of Kelly's friends who afterward measured the jump said that it was close to 23 1/2 feet. Kelly last year went nearly 25 feet in a meet, but at this time thought little of doing such a feat. So it looks as though he might before the season is over go up toward 26 feet.

Some of Kelly's intimate friends said that they thought the operation that was performed on him would hurt him this season, but Hayward and he both think that he is now stronger than ever before.

Kelly is a good example of what training and heredity will do for a man. As a boy Dan says that he was always running races. Moreover, his father, who was an athlete before the son, belonging to the champion hose team of the world, took an active interest in the boy's athletic feats, and is said to be much prouder of the Dan is himself.

Dan also is a good student, doing very well last year and this, though for a time he was unable to attend his classes on account of his operation.
