

WILL IMPROVE FOLEY SPRINGS SUMMER RESORT

A. A. Haffinger, of Foley Springs summer resort is in the city, having arrived up from Portland on the local last night in company with Mrs. Haffinger. They are on the way to the springs, expecting to leave for there Saturday or Sunday or as soon as the weather gets better. Mr. Haffinger told a Guard reporter today of a number of improvements which they expect to make at the resort this summer. It is possible to get the lumber in time a double-deck veranda will be built onto the front of the hotel. This improvement has been in contemplation since last summer, but heretofore it has been impossible to secure the lumber, the sawmill at Blue River being away behind with orders, and it would be too expensive to haul the lumber from the valley. Mr. Haffinger thinks he can get the lumber before the coming season is over, as a mill is to be erected at McKenzie Bridge and will be in operation within a few weeks.

An improvement that has long been in contemplation and will be made this year, if possible, is the piping of the hot water of the springs to the hotel, the office and the cottages for heating purposes. The early mornings and the evenings in that altitude are quite cold, even in the summer time, and the pleasure seekers hover close around the fires.

Mr. Haffinger has disposed of his restaurant business in Portland, and intends hereafter to make Foley Springs his permanent home. During the next few years other improvements not mentioned here will be made at the resort, and by the time the electric line up the McKenzie is completed they will be in shape to care for the much larger patronage they are bound to enjoy with the advent of the railway.

Hints on the Care of Jewelry

- Jewelry should not be thrown in a case promiscuously, as it will become scratched or scarred. Diamonds in particular, as they will scratch or nick each other.
- Wash frequently, using soap and warm water; rinse thoroughly in alcohol and dry in boxwood sawdust. Diamonds should be kept clean to be brilliant. The top becomes electric from the friction in wearing, while the back of the stone will become covered with dust or lint attracted thereby, which destroys its brilliancy.
- Diamond mountings should be examined frequently, to see that the clamps or claws do not wear and let the stone fall out, especially in finger rings.
- Pearls become discolored by the accumulation of grease, soap or similar substances collecting around the clamps and under the settings. They can be washed the same as other jewelry, but not with hot water.
