OPEN THE UPPER RIVER

Senator Fulton is making a tour of the state looking into the needs of the various localities. No doubt he will pay a visit to Eugene in the near future, and when he does the matter of opening the upper Willamette river to navigation should be presented to him.

There seems to be no hope of any material alleviation of present oppressive conditions until we are assured of water competition in freight rates. That this object may be secured by persistent and united effort in the right direction there is no doubt, since there are no conditions in the Willamette river that present serious obstacles to navigation. Millmen and others familiar with the stream declare that not more than three inexpensive locks and a thorough cleaning out of the channel will give unobstructed navigation between Eugene and Corvallis. Considering the large extent of territory that would be benefited the outlay required to make the improvement will be very small, and it ought not to be difficult to secure federal aid.

Senator Fulton and his colleagues of the Oregon congressional delegation should have this matter thoroughly impressed upon their attention.

The immense amount of extra business in the thousands of post-offices throughout the country brought about by the souvenir postcard craze has caused the department at Washington to make certain regulations to keep the fad within reasonable bounds. The sending of these souvenirs from end to end of the United States and to and from foreign countries has become so general, and the variety of missives so promiscuous that it has been found necessary to draw a line somewhere. Postmasters of the country in a recent bulletin from Washington have received special instructions with regard to handling these popular forms of communication. These instructions are given in the form of rules and are in effect as follows: "A postcard shall not exceed in size 3 and 9-16 by 5 and 9-16 inches nor be less than 2 3/4 by 4 inches, and shall in form, quality and weight correspond with the ordinary official postcard. It may be of any other color that will not materially interfere with the legibility of the address and postmark when stamped thereon. Its face may be divided vertically by a line to the left of which written communications may appear, but on the right nothing but the address shall be placed." This fact has thrown lots of these leather cards into the dead letter office.

Where more will probably collect until the ruling becomes generally known. In case, however, the leather cards contain no writing or the matter on the back is printed, it comes under the head of second-class mail matter and will go for one cent. The numerous piles of material used in the manufacture of post-cards, such as mica, birch bark, leather, celluloid, etc., and the diversion of taste employed in their decoration has caused no end of an-

noyance to the department, which has been forced, in self-defense, as it were, to seek protection through the enforcement of special rules to govern the handling of them.

State Treasurer Steel states that it was through no solicitation of his that his brother, James Steel, was appointed state bank examiner. We quite agree with the gentleman—it was not solicitation on his part but a hold-up that is akin to a bare-faced steal, spell it any way you choose, of an office.

The railroad commission promises to be a political issue again next year—and the sentiment for abolishment is likely to be unanimous. ABOLISH THE RAILROAD COMMISSION

The Albany Democrat wants the railroad commission abolished. It says:

"The railroad commission has made a mighty poor start. One of the first things it has done has been to raise the rates on timber and logs on the Falls City road, a small Polk county affair. Just because there was no remonstrance the raise asked for by the company was permitted. Now that the true situation has been learned the lumbermen are kicking like good fellows, as they have a right to do. Established to help the people the commission has made a donkey of itself by raising rates instead of dropping them. The rate is much higher than on the Corvallis & Eastern for shipment from Mill City.

"A special session of the legislature should be called and the railroad commission abolished. As anticipated by the people generally it will never be any good. About the only effective thing about it so far is the provision doing away with passes."

Notice is hereby given that the common council of the city of Eugene will receive bids for the construction of the improvement of Willamette street, from the south line of the Southern Pacific Company's right-of-way to the south line of Eleventh street, provided for under ordinance number 681, passed by the common council March 11, 1907, and approved by the mayor on March 11, 1907.

Said improvement to consist of the excavation of said street as provided for by the plans and specifications prepared therefor by the city engineer; the construction of uniform cement curbing in and along either side of said street between said points, to be constructed in accordance with plans and specifications prepared therefor by the city engineer, and for the pavement of said street between said points with bituminous pavement, said pavement to be in accordance with the plans and specifications prepared therefor by the city engineer, all of which plans and specifications are now on file in the office of the city recorder.

Bids for said improvement will be received by the common council at the office of the city recorder up to 7:30 o'clock p. m. on Tuesday, the 26th day of March, 1907, at which time said bids will be opened and considered by the common council.

Each of the above specified improvements are to be let by separate contract to the lowest responsible bidder therefor, the common council reserving the right to reject any or all bids.

A certified check for five per cent of the amount bid shall accompany each bid or proposal. The excavation, as provided by the plans and specifications, shall be completed within 70 days from letting of the contract therefor; the curbing provided for shall be completed within 70 days from the letting of the contract therefor, and the paving shall be completed within 90 days from the date of letting of the contract therefor.

Attention of all contractors is called to the agreement of Warren Brothers Company, filed with this city, in accordance with which agreement Warren Brothers Company agrees to license all contractors desiring to bid for the work to lay the bituminous pavement in accordance with its patents and the terms of said agreement.
