BOAT CLUB WILL HAVE CLUB HOUSE

Meeting Held Last Night—K. K. K. House and Dillard Residence Considered—Fifty-one Members.

The Eugene Boat Club held the second business meeting in its history last evening at Dr. Bartle's office. At this meeting the report of the committee on constitution was accepted and the constitution adopted. The membership committee reported 51 members, and the committee appointed to obtain sites for boat and club houses reported two sites—one, the Frazier property, known as the "K K K" house, on Patterson street at the mill race; the other, the Dillard place on East Eleventh street, near Patterson, which will be decided at the meeting next Tuesday. As soon as this is done work will begin on the boat and club houses and within a month, if expectations follow, they will be ready for use.

The Eugene Boat Club, as the preamble to the constitution reads, is "to encourage boating on the waters in and around the vicinity of Eugene; for the protection of its members and their property, and for the improvement and edifying of said waterways."

The club will build a boat house sufficiently large to accommodate 100 boats, with a large club house for its members. During the boating season races, tournaments and excursions will be held. In fact, as far as possible, the club will be carried on similarly to those in the larger cities.

The officers for the ensuing year stand as follows: President, Dr. Ira Bartle; vice president, Herbert Burton; secretary, Lloyd Bellman; treasurer, Carl Washburn. The board of governors is composed of the president, Dr. Bartle, J. V. Reed, F. E. Dunn, H. J. McClannahan and H. A. Dunbar. The club colors are navy blue and white.

LECTURER FOR AUDUBON SOCIETY SPEAKS

William L. Finley Addressed Students of University This Morning on "The Water Fowl of the Klamath Country."

Wm. L. Finley, national lecturer for the Audubon Society and president of the Oregon branch, delivered at the university assembly this morning a splendid illustrated address on "The Waterfowl of the Klamath District." Picture after picture was shown of every bird that inhabits the region, some in exactly their natural colors, others in the plain dark and light of the usual photograph.

After a number had been shown and described by accurate word pictures of habits and traits, and the interest and feelings of the three hundred people aroused, Mr. Finley spoke very strongly on market hunting. The slaughter in the Klamath country has been awful, some seasons 60,000 or 80,000 birds being killed to please the palates of San Francisco, where the bodies are shipped. Twenty or thirty hunters during the season constantly hunt, and in a comparatively short time make enough to support themselves all the year. For canvas back ducks \$8 a dozen are paid, and the lowest price, \$3, is for teal. The hunter kills from one hundred to one hundred and fifty a day.

Protection of waterfowl in the Klamath lake section would be a boon to the whole Pacific coast, from the Yukon to lower California, for during the summers the birds which are natives of California come to the lake section of Southern Oregon, and in winter the fowl as far north as the great Yukon river, the land of the Klondike, come to breed.

Mr. Finley delivered a second interesting lecture on the subject this afternoon, especially for the public school children.

M. SVARVERUD MAKES STATEMENT

Inasmuch as the so-called municipal ownership candidates have made a declaration on the question at issue in the coming city election, it becomes necessary for me to state in brief my position.

I am strongly in favor of maintaining a pure water system for the city of Eugene, and will endeavor with all my power, if elected a member of the city council, to accomplish this result. I am, however, not in favor of installing an apposition plant. The city council in the past two years has worked along that line, and with the intention of installing opposition plants of both light and water. This, in my opinion, would be a death blow to the city; it would cause entanglements, disagreements, litigation, and would retard the growth of our beautiful city.

If I am elected I will work faithfully to the end that the city shall have pure water, and if municipal ownership of the water system is the only means by which we can restore public confidence, then I am strongly in favor of owning the water plant, and in that case immediate steps should be taken by the incoming council for the negotiation of the water plant, and submit their finding to the people for their approval or disapproval.

I have lived in Eugene for eighteen years, and if during all these years I have shown public enterprise — if I have done my share of public improvements in the part of the city where I reside, then I should be entitled to your consideration. If I have not, I am not entitled to your support.

I am under no obligation to any corporation or institution of any kind, and will conservatively act upon all matters pertaining to the welfare of the city.

TICKET AT COTTAGE GROVE

Agreeable to a regularly published call for a meeting of citizens of Cottage Grove to nominate a city ticket to be called the taxpayers' ticket, a goodly number assembled at the Masonic hall Friday night, March 22, and promptly at 8 o'clock David Mann took the platform and nominated Hon.
