M. SVARVERUD MAKES STATEMENT

Inasmuch as the so-called municipal ownership candidates have made a declaration on the question at issue in the coming city election, it becomes necessary for me to state in brief my position.

I am strongly in favor of maintaining a pure water system for the city of Eugene, and will endeavor with all my power, if elected a member of the city council, to accomplish this result. I am, however, not in favor of installing an opposition plant. The city council in the past two years has worked along that line, and with the intention of installing opposition plants of both light and water. This, in my opinion, would be a death blow to the city; it would cause entanglements, disagreements, litigation, and would retard the growth of our beautiful city.

If I am elected I will work faithfully to the end that the city shall have pure water, and if municipal ownership of the water system is the only means by which we can restore public confidence, then I am strongly in favor of owning the water plant, and in that case immediate steps should be taken by the incoming council for the negotiation of the water plant, and submit their findings to the people for their approval or disapproval.

I have lived in Eugene for eight years, and during all these years I have shown public enterprise—if I have done my share of public improvements in the part of the city where I reside, then I should be entitled to your consideration. If I have not, I am not entitled to your support.

I am under no obligation to any corporation or institution of any kind, and will conservatively act upon all matters pertaining to the welfare of the city.

MR. OSBURN STATES POSITION TO THE VOTERS

To the Voters of Eugene:—

Having very reluctantly permitted myself to become a candidate for mayor at the approaching election next Monday, I stand pledged, if elected, as far as it may lie in my power, to see that Eugene is furnished with a good and wholesome water supply. If the present supply is good, the Willamette Valley Company has been very much maligned; if bad, the people have a right to know it and a remedy should be applied. The water should be tested from time to time that the people may know its condition. All tests that have been made since the water has been filtered show the same to be pure. I have no matured plans as to how or who should make this test, but I herewith submit a resolution passed by the Lane County Medical Society at its meeting in January of this year, which may well be worth considering. The resolution is as follows: "Moved that it be the sense of this society that the city authorities provide for a permanent water commission to supervise the water supply."

I further pledge myself as far as it may lie with the mayor, to give the city an economical administration along conservative lines, and to this end I am opposed to a bond issue for any purpose when the same can by any possibility be avoided. More bonds mean more taxes, and high taxes not only keeps capital out but drives capital away. A settled policy is what we want, and this can never be attained by ceaseless and continuous agitation.

As to municipal ownership, permit me to quote from a dispatch in the Oregonian of February 10, 1907, as follows:

"Indianapolis, Ind., Feb. 9, 1907.—Those Indiana towns which were in a frenzy to try municipal ownership are now pleading with the legislature to relieve them of the infamous burden of heavy taxation, rotten service and insolence on the part of officials who are responsible to no one but themselves. So far as the experience of this state goes, and it has been fairly wide and representative, municipal ownership of anything is a grand failure."

"Muncie and Hartford City have surrendered their municipal plants after a varied and costly experience. Each year added to the indebtedness without giving an adequate return to the people. It is argued that if such enterprises were contemplated and a state commission should look the field over and advise against it, such advice would go farther toward restraining municipalities from voting burdens upon themselves, and would save not only the credit of such cities, but exempt them from worry and contention that have marked many an embarking in municipal ownership."

And, finally, I believe that where any considerable amount of money is involved that contracts should be let in open council, that the people may know by the proceedings what is going on, and that, too, after the necessary funds are provided. Prudent men in their private affairs provide money before contracting to spend it, and I certainly believe the people should have the benefit of this simple but fundamental business principle. If this principle had been followed in the past the city would not now be involved in a suit with Mr. Kelsay for several thousand dollars for services which have proved of no value to the people.

The campaign between the candidates has been clean and pleasant, and will continue in that way. I shall find fault with no man for voting against me who believes the principles represented by my opponent the best for the city. We are engaged in the discussion of principles, not personalities. I prefer to be beaten on a straight, square issue than to win by misrepresentation and abuse.

A word more of a personal nature. I am the owner of no stock in any corporation that could possibly be affected by municipal ownership any more than other property might be affected. I never owned a dollar's worth of stock in the water company, and what stock I owned in the light company was disposed of more than a year and a half ago.

TO RECOVER POSSESSION OF LAND

Ulysses B. Sutherland, insane, by J. C. Sutherland, his guardian, today instituted suit in the circuit court against A. M. and Mary Richardson for the recovery of a certain 160 acres of timber land in section 20, township 18 south of range 8 west, which the plaintiff alleges the defendants acquired unlawfully and fraudulently.

The complaint alleges that in June, 1900, the plaintiff took up the land as a homestead; that in May, 1904, he entered into an agreement with the plaintiffs whereby he should relinquish the land to the government and that Mary Richardson should purchase the same as a timber claim, the plaintiff to have half of the land. The patent to the land has been received by the defendant. It is alleged, the date of the same being May 1, 1907. It is alleged that in May, 1904, when the agreement was made that the plaintiff should relinquish the land he was of unsound mind and was incapacitated from transacting business; that the defendants, taking advantage of this incapacity, induced him to sign the relinquishment with the intent to cheat and defraud him, and fraudulently secured patent to the land which the plaintiff was justly entitled to.

The plaintiff demands a judgment and decree that the contract be declared null and void; that it be declared that the defendant, Mary Richardson, holds title to the land in trust for said Ulysses Sutherland, and that the defendants be required to make to the plaintiff a conveyance of the land. The parties to the suit are all residents of the western part of the county, in the vicinity of Walton, and the plaintiff, Ulysses Sutherland, is now in the insane asylum at Salem. J. A. Buchanan is his attorney.
