OREGON WIN DEBATE IN TWO STATE MEETS

ship of the Northwest last night in the big Tri-State League debates with the University of Washington and Idaho by winning the debate in Eugene by a vote of two to one and the debate at Moscow three to nothing. As the decision counts one point and the vote of each judge one point, Oregon made altogether seven points. Idaho won from Washington at Seattle, it is understood, unanimously, which gives her four points, leaving Washington only one point, which she made by convincing a judge here.

The Debate Last Night

The debate at the theatre last night was red hot, though there was never any serious doubt as to which side had the upper hand. In fact, it was a big surprise that Washington received the vote of a single judge, and that they did so shows the variability of human judgment. Nevertheless, the negative team put up some good argument, their chief fault lying in lack of organization and the failure of Rasmussen, the last speaker, to perceive the vital points of the argument. Hall, the second speaker, seemed to put up the best talk for the visiting team, though Hawes, the first man, did very well. For Oregon Veatch undoubtedly was the star, for he surpassed even his own brilliant reputation. Whealdon and Latourette, the other two Oregon speakers, did the bigger part of the constructive work.

Oregon built up her case from the foundation, and never for a moment did any of her speakers forget for whom she was working or a single step. They made the path of argument which they trod so plain that it resembled a wall of stone, when Veatch put the last bit of cement into it.

The Argument

Oregon maintained that the fifteenth amendment and the part of the fourteenth in the question were not doing the least good, and indeed actual harm. They showed and evidently proved that all the great troubles of the South were due to these amendments. Oregon did not attempt to approve of the disenfranchisement of the negro, but rather believed that fuller suffrage would result in the repeal of these amendments. Washington denied most of these things and asserted that the amendments were an actual power for good, and that the condition of the South was rapidly improving. On their side, however, there was a lack of evidence, the affirmative proof overwhelming their opponents. The negative also failed to see the vital points at times, and gave much evidence that the home team turned to their own account.

Whealdon Opens

C. L. Whealdon opened the debate for Oregon, and after defining the situation showed how the negro was forced to crime and debauchery by lack of respect for law incurred by the failure of enforcement of the amendments. He also carried this further and plainly but strongly described how the whites combined against the negroes into one great party regardless of principle and stooped to crime and fraud to protect their homes against the Africans. He pointed out lastly how the discontent and crime in the South would probably spread over the whole nation and how all these things were directly and indirectly due to the failure of the enforcement of the fifteenth amendment.

Ed Hawes was the first speaker for the negative. He brought out that the amendments were inevitable and that the whites in the South were not keeping the negro from the ballot unless he was unworthy. He showed that the condition of the negroes was nearly as good as that of the whites, and that they were good citizens.

J. R. Latourette spoke next for the affirmative. He brought out very distinctly that the white element was willing for the negro to vote where worthy, and were spending more money to make them worthy than the negroes pay in taxes. He added additional proof and enforcement of Whealdon's argument.

Charles R. Hall, for the negative, said that the amendments were not the cause at all for the troubles of the South, and that the fifteenth amendment rather protected the blacks by making the South try to cultivate them to a standard where they might become good citizens.

J. G. Veatch, leader of Oregon, then arose and made the speech of the night. He made some strong rebuttals, and then went to the point that the amendments were not enforced, never were and never will be. This lack of enforcement bred in the negroes and whites alike a disrespect for the law which, especially in this country, might become fatal to the national welfare. In closing his speech he summed up the argument for his side so effectively
