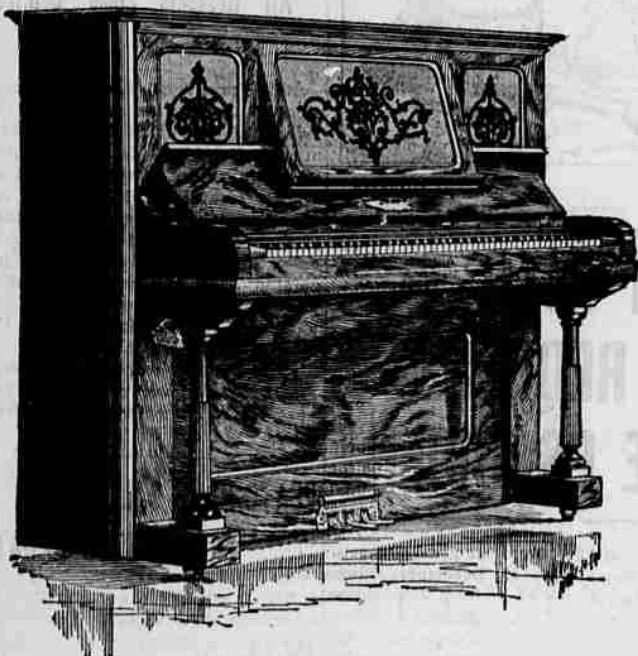

VOTERS SPEAK OUT FOR CITY OWNERSHIP

Entire Ticket, Headed by J. D. Matlock, is Elacted - Contest for Office of Councilmen in Two Wards Very Close - Griffin Beaten by Only One Vote

The entire municipal ownership ticket was elected yesterday by majorities ranging from 1 to 101 for councilman, and to 180 for mayor. In the Third ward I. N. Harbaugh defeated G. W. Griffin by a single vote. In the second ward the vote was also close, Frank N. McAllister being beaten by George Fisher by a majority of only seven. The others showed about the usual strength of the two sides of the question, in the First T. H. Garrett winning over M. Svarverud by 101 votes, and in the Fourth F. J. Berger won over Geo. G. Gross by 27. J. D. Matlock won over his opponent, F. W. Osburn, for mayor, by a majority of 180.

Solid for Ownership.

The city council will now be solid for municipal ownership, and it is expected that immediate action looking to the acquiring of the Willamette Valley Company's plant or of putting in a new system will be taken. The council will hereafter consist of the following:

Mayor, J. D. Matlock; councilmen from the First ward, W. W. Calkins and T. H. Garrett; Second ward, R. B. Henderson and George Fisher; Third ward, A. W. Gilbert and I. N. Harbaugh; Fourth ward, D. M. McCrady and F. J. Berger.

Will Purchase Company's Plant.

The Guard learns that the new council will not endeavor to construct a new plant at present, but will make overtures to the company with a view of purchasing the plant now in operation. The plan to tap the McKenzie

river for a supply of cold mountain water will be carried out later. It is thought that the company will be willing to sell at a reasonable price and it will no doubt be glad to get out of the water business entirely and devote its time and attention to the light plant and the electric railway.
