UNANSWERABLE QUESTIONS

An editorial, "What Is a Democrat?" from the New York World, is being reprinted in many state papers, the Oregonian having first reproduced it, properly credited, of course. The World, which never has adhered to any party affiliation, ridicules the idea that there is any possibility of harmonizing the divergent views of Bryan, Cleveland, Hearst and Belmont, who are mentioned as representative Democrats, and hence the editorial query, "What Is a Democrat?"

The World raises a pertinent question, and following up its line of thought, should ask, "What is a Republican?" What political wizard is there who can frame a platform upon which Roosevelt, Harriman, Cannon, Fairbanks, Rockefeller and Binger Hermann may stand at ease, satisfied with all the planks that enter into its construction?

As a matter of fact party lines have been obliterated, and old-time party prejudice minimized by the trend of events. The people of the United States have at last awakened to the fact that for years past the political party has been, not an instrument used to advance measures of common good, but rather the means by which personal machines were constructed for spoliation of the masses. Naturally there has come a revulsion of feeling and independent voting and political action is the sequence. Loyalty to party is no longer boasted, but is regarded more as a weakness to be apologized for. The prominent members of both parties are more fearless and outspoken in their opinions, caring little for the platform utterances of their respective parties, and the rank and file are emulating their example and thinking for themselves. The present generation is no longer voting for "Old Hickory" Jackson or Abe Lincoln.

We need not go beyond our own state to find ample proof that party lines are no longer respected. A state that gave the Republican Roosevelt 40,000 majority has elected a Democratic governor and mayor of its chief city. Even such rock-ribbed political newspapers as ex-Governor Geer's Pendleton Tribune admit that the tide of non-partisanship is rolling over the state, and are forced to endorse it, as the following from the Tribune will show:

"The Tribune sincerely hopes public notice will be taken of the fact that the republican railroad commission has appointed a democratic clerk and that the democratic board of sheep inspectors has selected a republican secretary.

"All such boards should be non-partisan in their operations and the indifference to the political cast of their minor officers is to be accepted with general approval."

There is no doubt but the two absolutely unanswerable questions of the present are: What is a Democrat? What is a Republican?

The Evening Herald, published at Klamath Falls, in discussing the referendum movement, against the

University of Oregon, says: "The referendum law is a relic of the late wave of populism that was taken up by the Republican party and carried to a successful conclusion. It has already proved a very expensive piece of legislation, and promises to still further add to the burdens of the taxpayer ere it is wiped off the statute book. The theory is most excellent, but in practice it proves otherwise. The people will uphold the appropriation by a large majority, for it is well known that our educational institutions are the mainstay of our government."

Professor J. B. Horner, of the Oregon Agricultural College, has issued his six lectures, "A Vacation in the Mediterranean," in book form—a neat paper-covered volume that is illustrated with many excellent photographs. The lectures contain much information that is valuable to the student and thinker, told in plain, pure English of which Professor Horner is a master. This little book might be read with profit by any one, and especially those who never had an opportunity to visit the scene described.

The latest daily newspaper on our exchange list is the Nampa (Idaho) Evening Leader, published by H. W. Mansfield, a well-known Oregonian, and Mrs. Mansfield, who was a Eugene girl before her marriage, does most of the editorial work. Nampa is one of the boom towns of the Gem state, and the Leader, since it became a daily paper, is keeping fully abreast of the wonderful growth of its town and state.

"Silent" Smith, late broker and multi-millionaire, died while traveling in Japan on his wedding tour, but the adjective is not applicable to members of the family who think they have a right to share in the fifty odd millions he left.
