SCHEDULE OF BRANCH ROAD DELAYS MAIL

Coburg People Suffer From Poor Mail Service Because Stage Arrives at Springfield After Train Leaves There in Morning - Mail Soon to Leave Main Line at Springfield Junction

Many complaints having come from Coburg regarding the delay in the arrival of the Daily Guard at that office, the matter was referred to the chief clerk of the railway mail service for investigation. The following letter explains the matter, and also offers the hope of a change for the better in a short time:

"Guard Printing Company, Eugene, Oregon.
Dear Sir:—Replying to your letter of recent date wherein complaint is made relative to delay of papers for Coburg, I beg to advise you that train 49 of the Springfield branch leaves Springfield at 4:30 a. m., under the present schedule, or before the arrival of the messenger from Eugene, who must wait at the latter place for a connection with main line train 16.

In this connection I will say that the department has advertised for bids to carry the mails between Springfield Junction and Springfield. The bids were closed on March 26th. When this service is established direct connection will be made with train 49 at Springfield.

MRS. TRAVIS DIES AT MYRTLE POINT

Passed Away This Morning in the Coos County Town After an Illness of Only a Few Days' Duration of Pneumonia—Remains Will Be Brought Here.

Attorney L. R. Edmunson this morning received a message from Myrtle Point stating that his mother-in-law, Mrs. D. J. Travis, a well-known Eugene resident, died there at 2 o'clock this morning after an illness of only a few days' duration, of pneumonia. Attorney Lee M. Travis and Mrs. Edmunson, who are now at Myrtle Point, having gone there a few days ago in response to a message stating that their mother was very ill, will bring the body to Eugene for burial, bringing it around by way of Portland by water. It will probably be a week or more before it arrives, as the steamer service between Coos Bay and Portland is not the best.

Mrs. Travis was the widow of a former well-known Baptist minister of this city and had lived here many years. She leaves the following children: Seward Travis, of Greenport, Long Island; Attorney Lee M. Travis, of Eugene; Mrs. L. R. Edmunson, of Eugene; Carl Travis, who is attending the Ann Arbor Law School in Michigan, and Miss Emma Travis, of Eugene. Carl is now on his way here from the East, having been summoned as soon as it was learned that Mrs. Travis was seriously ill.

The deceased was aged 60 years and was prominent in church and lodge work here. She had been at Myrtle Point on business for the past two months.
