DR. ATWOOD ARRESTED FOR MANSLAUGHTER

Former Eugene Physician Behind the Bars at Portland Charged With Performing Criminal Operation Upon a Sixteen-Year-Old Girl in That City

The Portland Sunday Journal has the following sensational story concerning a former Eugene physician: Dr. C. H. T. Atwood, with offices in the Lewis building, was arrested yesterday afternoon for manslaughter resulting from a criminal operation performed March 5 on Hattie Fee, a 16-year-old school girl. Dr. Atwood was arrested on a warrant sworn out in the district attorney's office and was taken to the county jail in lieu of bail which was fixed by Deputy District Attorney Bert Haney at \$2,500. The girl is being cared for at the home of her sister on the east side.

W. B. Haldiman, who is responsible for the girl's downfall, was arrested Thursday afternoon and is held at the county jail. Mixed in with the revolting phases of the story of Hattie Fee is a deal of tragic sadness, which makes the offenses of the men all the more terrible. For two years the girl has been living in the homes of various respectable families of Portland, earning her board and clothes that she might attend school. She has always borne an excellent reputation and those who know her hold Haldiman and Atwood responsible for the present condition of affairs.

Haldiman is an electrician with a home at 1019 East Thirteenth street north. He is about 40 years old, divorced from his wife and has the custody of his sons, aged 12 and 14 years. For some time he has been keeping company with the girl's mother, Mrs. Katherine L. Fee, who works at the Union depot and resides at 520 East Pine street. It was while paying his attentions to Mrs. Fee that Haldiman became intimate with the young girl.

Unknown to the mother the relations continued for some time until shortly after the operation was performed. Even then the love of Mrs. Fee for Haldiman and fear of notoriety is said to have sealed her lips and had the true facts not leaked through other sources, no action would probably have been taken to prosecute Haldiman and Atwood.

Through the Travelers' Aid Society disclosures were made that brought the matter to the district attorney's office, where it was turned over to Deputy Bert Haney. He assigned Detective P. Maher to the case. The girl and the mother were closely questioned and have given sworn statements of their knowledge of the crimes. Haldiman was then arrested and he too confessed and his statement is in Mr. Haney's office.

To conclude the evidence around Atwood is the sworn statement of his assistant, whose name is withheld because of her reputation. She is working in Atwood's office to pay off fees which Atwood charged against her father for medical attention. Mr. Haney has her affidavit and it is considered most damaging against the prisoner.

Atwood is well known about Portland and is a member of several lodges. In addition to his office in the Lewis building he has a private hospital at Tremont Place, where it is alleged he has conducted similar operations.

As a result of the arrest of Atwood and the exposure following, an organized movement will be started by the district attorney, to investigate all manuring and massage parlors in Portland, as well as institutions similar to that run by Atwood. If evidence is found that they are being run for illegitimate purposes, they will be closed and the owners prosecuted.

The penalty for manslaughter is a sentence in the state penitentiary of from one to fifteen years and a fine of \$1,000.
