REFERENDUM MOVEMENT MAY FAIL

President Campbell, of the University of Oregon, addressed the students Friday night, explaining the referendum which the Linn county grangers are attempting to invoke. He said that the grangers did not seem to have any grudge against the university, but simply thought the state could not support such appropriations when the legislature would not create new means for deriving an income.

He also explained the greatest needs of the university, showing very plainly how \$180,000 was much heavier the sum that should be expended. He pointed out especially that the present tax would mean an assessment of only thirty cents on the thousand dollars to support the school, and mentioned that those who would contribute toward the referendum would spend more than their taxes would amount to with very few exceptions.

Movement May Fail.

The prospects for the failure of the movement are very good, for while Linn county seems favorable to the invoking of the referendum most of the others, including the state grange, have expressed sentiments against such a project.

The university needs the money very badly for improvements, and the cutting off of the income even for a year and a half would mean a vast loss to the institution and naturally to the state.

OMAR WISDOM'S ACCIDENT NOT VERY SERIOUS

He Was Badly Bruised by Being Caught Between Steamer and Wharf, But No Bones Were Broken.

The Florence West tells of the accident to Omar Wisdom as follows: Last Friday afternoon Omar Wisdom of Glenada met with an accident in which he was considerably injured, but which might easily have cost him his life.

He was on his way up the river on board the steamer Hazel, when the boat ran up to Neilson's landing above Point Terrace. Just as the steamer came up to the wharf, Omar stepped off the boat, when in some way he slipped and fell into the water between the Hazel and the wharf. The momentum of the boat carried it along and Omar was caught between the steamer and the wharf and rolled and slid along for some distance. As soon as possible he was helped out of the water and taken on board the boat.

The mail was sent to Mapleton by Sweet Brothers' launch and the Hazel came back down the river to bring Mr. Wisdom home. Dr. Edwards was called and found him injured in several places but no bones broken. He improved rapidly under the doctor's care and is able to be around again.

RIGHTS OF RIPARIAN OWNERS ARE INVOLVED

An important case, one that will, if appealed to the supreme court, and which will probably be done, which determines the rights of riparian owners in this state, was tried before Judge Harris, of the circuit court, today. The case is entitled S. J. Godard vs. Joseph Gillespie, and is an injunction suit to restrain Gillespie from diverting the waters of Lane creek, in the vicinity of Walterville, from its channel for irrigation purposes. Gillespie's place is above that of Godard's both lie on this creek. It appears that Gillespie began using the water for irrigation purposes last fall, whereupon Godard began suit against him to enjoin him from using the water because it diminished the flow in the creek below.

While the case itself is insignificant, it involves an important question, and the decision will be watched for with a great deal of interest. Williams & Bean are Godard's attorneys, and Thompson & Hardy for Gillespie.
