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H. H. NORTHRUP MAKES ADDRESS TO STUDENTS

The students of the university at assembly this morning were taken back to the birth of the nation and by quotation and reference, but most of all by the personality of Judge H. H. Northrup, of Portland, were made to feel the great causes back of the two great wars in our nation's history. The address was on the subject, "The Two Rebellions," and was a general outline of the causes which brought on the two wars, interspersed with the deeds of the notable and prominent Americans in the battles on field and council hall.

Then the great critical period between the Revolution and the Civil War was discussed with particular attention to the things which made the Civil War inevitable. Those things were in the main the defects in the constitution which allowed the theory of state sovereignty, and secondly, slavery.

DEMENTED WOMAN WALKS LONG WAY IN RAIN

Says She Left Her Husband At Pleasant Hill Because He Abused Her. Also Left Her Little Son—Returns Home Today.

The attention of Chief of Police Farrington was called today to the actions of an apparently demented woman by the name of Weaver. She went to the Underwood House last evening and engaged lodgings for the night. The proprietor of the house at once saw that something was wrong with the woman and began to question her. She gave him her name and said she had walked all the way from Pleasant Hill in the rain, having run away from her husband because he had abused her, and also left her little son at home. The actions of the woman were very strange, but she was allowed to remain over night, and the chief of police was notified today. He made an investigation and found that the woman was laboring under some kind of a hallucination, but apparently harmless. She was persuaded to return home, and was accompanied to the depot, where she took the afternoon train for Goshen, the nearest railroad point to Pleasant Hill. The woman said her husband was an old man, over 70 years of age, while she is somewhere in her thirties.

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MISS HENDRICKS GETS SCHOLARSHIP AT WELLESLEY

Miss Norma Hendricks, a graduate of the University in 1906, and a well-known Eugene girl, has been notified that a scholarship in German has been granted her at Wellesley. While at the university Miss Hendricks majored under Professor Schmidt, who was very largely instrumental in obtaining the honor. The scholarship is good during 1907-08. Miss Hendricks will take very advanced work. This winter she has been teaching at the Drain Normal.

SHOWER OF SILVER COIN

Money Really Rains In New York Sky-scrappers Nowadays—Very Popular Event.

Those who toll by day in the Park Row building in New York city were treated to a coin shower as they were going home on a recent afternoon. Three employees were taking \$28,000 of the Interborough Transit company collection of nickels, dimes, quarters and half dollars from the Interborough offices on the fifth floor. The coin was in 120 bags, piled on a truck, which had been pushed on to the elevator.

The extra weight caused the platform to fall. The bags of money were spread over the platform of the elevator.

Two bags, containing \$500 in quarters, fell outside the lift and broke into a silver shower. There was a rush of frenzied financiers to the basement. But the elevator men, armed with brooms and shovels, surrounded the pile at the bottom of the shaft before the investigators could arrive.

Killed by Shaving in Sleep.

OREGON MEN ROUNDING INTO FORM

Training Table Established For Members of Track Team - No April Vacation for the Men Who Will Stay Here to Get Ready for Stanford - List of Entries for Columbia Meet

Though many stars and teams will participate in the Columbia track meet next Saturday the University of Oregon men expect to win the honors of the day, and this week are putting in some strenuous touches to their training in order to be in the best possible form to meet their opponents. Moulton, the pole vaulter, and Kuykendall, the sprinter, who is taking up that form of track work as well, are rounding in fine form and expect to take first and second places from Swann, the O. A. C. man. The weight men are also in good form and have put the shot out to 43 feet this year. In the mile there will be something for Davolt, of Corvallis, to beat. Oregon has had a fine bunch of distance men out this year, and in the track tryouts Saturday a distance of 150 yards more than a mile was run in five minutes on the campus paths, which are very slow.

The half and quarter will also be well represented, and Oregon will not concede first places in these events to any one, even though the season is very early yet.

Training Table.

Today the training table was established, the object being preparation for the Stanford meet, rather than the Columbia. About twenty men have places on the special fare. Among them will be one or two surprises for Stanford, men who will not run at Portland Saturday. They are considered very promising, and as Oregon realizes the closeness of the result of the Stanford meet she does not aim that her opponents shall know everything about her.

Oregon Entries.

The Oregon entries for the Columbia meet will be as follows:
Fifty yard dash, Kelly, Moores and Huston; 50-yard hurdles, Moores, Huston, and Kuykendall; 220-yard dash, Moores, Kiltz and Kelly; 440-yard dash, Reed, Dodson and Kiltz; half mile, Wood, Reed and Dodson; mile, Platz, Jamison and Woods; pole vault, Moulton and Kuykendall; shot put, Hug and McKinney; high jump, Henderson and Kuykendall; broad, Kelly, Kuykendall and Henderson. The relay team will be made up of Kelly, Moores, Huston, Kiltz or Reed. Oregon has a fine lot of 220-yard men, though she lost Priddy, and will have from the present outlook a much better team than last year.

No Vacation for Team.

Trainer Hayward will keep his track squad during the April vacation in training for the Stanford meet here May 3, and though many of them dislike remaining at the university during that week there are none who will not sacrifice their own pleasure that much for the team, especially as by not doing so he would be likely to lose his place.

The next meet after the Stanford date will be one with O. A. C., at Corvallis, about May 24 or 25. On June 1 or 2 the triangular meet at Seattle will be held, and if an offer from Whitman is accepted one with the missionaries June 7 or 8 at Whitman or in Portland.
