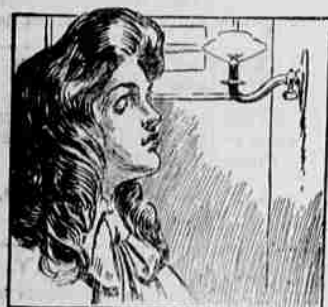

KLAMATH PEOPLE

REPUDIATE BONUS

The Klamath Herald of April 1st says: Two years ago this summer the people of Klamath subscribed a bonus of \$100,000 payable to the Klamath Development Company, provided a railroad completed and in operation from Weed by March 31, 1907. The time limit expired yesterday, but the railroad is by no means completed. Many subscription deeds were in the form of trust deeds to lands, and today a number of subscribers have demanded from the trustees, G. W. White and Alex Martin, Jr., a return of these trust deeds. However, a clause in the agreement provided that in the event of any delay being caused in the construction of the railroad by reason of injunction or condemnation suits, floods, labor strikes or unavoidable accidents, then it shall be deemed that the railroad has been constructed within the meaning of the agreement.

Last Wednesday the Klamath Development Company served a notice on the trustees, notifying them that the work of construction of the railroad has been delayed in such a way that it brings it within the terms of the contract, and requesting them not to reconvey any of the titles held by them as trustees to the makers of such deeds.

It is understood that a test case is to be instituted in the near future, and it will then be ascertained whether the deeds will hold or not. It is presumed that the San Francisco earthquake and fire will be included in the "unavoidable accidents" clause.

SOUTH OREGON PYTHIANS WILL COMPETE FOR CUP

Roseburg, Or., April 6.—At the regular convention of Alpha lodge, No. 147, Knights of Pythias, B. W. Strong was elected grand representative of this lodge to go to Portland May 25 to the grand lodge of Oregon. The district convention of this district will meet at Eugene April 25, in connection with the Eugene, Cottage Grove and Roseburg teams. This convention will decide which team shall go to the grand lodge to compete with the different teams of the state for the \$100 cup that is offered by the Portland lodge for the team that does the best work.
