ENEMIES OF EDUCATION

The Salem Journal declares that it is not making a fight on higher education; yet it singles out the state university appropriation for its unreasonable attacks, and prints with approval the insane statements of the referendum workers to the effect that it costs too much money to maintain a state university. The Journal has not a word of condemnation for the lavish spending of money on Salem institutions, its policy seeming to be more money for penal and reformatory institutions—less money for the cause of education. Such a platform is worthy only of the paper that has adopted it.

The Journal's platform is despicable when compared with the liberal utterances of Hon. A. T. Buxton, president of the state senate, who said the other day to a Salem Statesman reporter:

"The movement for a referendum vote upon the University of Oregon appropriation started among the people of Linn county, but the grange as an organization favors higher education. It has been said that the grange would not take action on the appropriation of the Oregon Agricultural college because some of our officers are members of the board of regents of that institution. This is not the fact. Did not the grange believe in education it would take both appropriations, that of the university and of the agricultural college, before the people just as quick as it has taken the other two measures."

Mr. Buxton owns a farm near Forest Grove which is one of the best kept and most profitable in Washington county. He is a graduate of the Oregon Agricultural College and has for many years been identified with the grange and is connected with all progressive civic movements which tend to the building up and beautifying of his pretty home town. Such men as Buxton build up a state and stand always for progress and improvement, only to have many of their best efforts fall because of the work done by narrow, prejudiced newspapers of the Journal class. The editors of such publications realize that their papers decline in circulation and influence with advancing intelligence and education.

TO ADVERTISE OUR RESOURCES.

It would be a paying investment for Eugene to establish a permanent exhibit near the depot, if a place to install it could be secured. Medford has done this with surprisingly good results, scores of railroad passengers crowding the building at every stop of the train. The town and surrounding country is just now the most-talked-of section of Oregon, and a wonderful growth is being experienced. No doubt that fine exhibit of products of the orchard, forest, field and mine has had much to do with creating this widespread interest.

The Guard believes that such an exhibit as Medford has might be installed here at a cost not to exceed that of an advertising campaign in

East. Papers, perhaps it would not be so expensive, and we believe the returns would be quicker and surer.

The plan is well worth serious consideration.

The statement that a Rockefeller-Hearst-Harriman combine, with an initial slush fund of \$5,000,000, had been formed to "create" sentiment against Rooseveltism—and of course for high finance methods—may make the mouths of purchasable "others" water, but that it can be a factor in the policy toward Russia of the government would be an insult to public intelligence to believe.
