QUEER COMBINATION

The Oregon City Star seems to have the situation sized up about right in the following editorial:

"The Salem Capital Journal has started a campaign to secure the referendum on the University of Oregon appropriation of \$125,000 a year and the sum (\$100,000) voted for construction of eight armories; also to initiate a bill to place the state printer on a flat salary, and another to appropriate \$50,000 annually for the Monmouth Normal.

"By just what course of reasoning these two appropriations are singled out for a referendum vote, and why he wants a bill to give the Monmouth Normal \$50,000, the editor of the Capital Journal does not make clear.

"Unless we have made a mistake in adding, the Salem Institutions fed by state pay swallow up something like a million dollars. Wouldn't it be more business-like to take a vote on the big bills before wasting time and money on comparatively small ones?

"Why strain at a gnat and swallow a camel?"

"Or is all this hullabaloo about the university appropriation just a scheme to throw dust in the taxpayers' eyes while Salem rakes in the big spoils?"

Grants Pass is pulling hard for factories. The Commercial Club of that place has just secured the location of a large door and box factory there, and is going after a fruit cannery next. The Southern Oregon city was always awake and hustling, and now its commercial organization has decided to use its efforts and funds toward the establishing of enterprises of this sort, rather than scattering literature, feeling that there is urgent need of developing the resources of the county for the sustenance of the present population.

Pomona grange, of Clackamas county, according to the Oregon City Star, at a meeting last Saturday attended by 200 members, strongly opposed the movement of the Linn county grangers to invoke the referendum against the University of Oregon appropriation. Pomona is the largest and most influential grange lodge in the state.

Senator Carter, a member of the postal commission provided by congress, says experts will be employed to locate postal leaks. Hope they will save more than they cost, but are not over-confident.

The city of Ghent, Belgium, is going to experiment with police-women, which will probably result in considerable "swearing off" among the "gents" whose wives get the jobs.

Conversions by telephone will be made possible in Albany commencing with next Sunday. The time has passed when it is necessary to attend church to get the benefit of the minister's sermons, or enjoy the music of the trained choir, says the Albany Herald.

No longer will the faithful church member be compelled to go through the wintry weather to his chosen house of worship. The Christophone, the epitome of modern telephonic invention, has been installed in the United Presbyterian church in this city, and patrons of the Home Telephone Company who so desire, can now live abed Sunday mornings as long as they wish. To hear the sermon and the entire church service the lazy man or the sick person will hereafter only have the labor of taking down the telephone receiver. When the collection plate is passed you won't need to begin searching for the coin you thought you had, but can lie quietly in bed and listen to the fingle. The minister will not be discouraged in the least if he arrives some Sunday morning to find no one present besides himself and the organist and choir. The service will go on just the same, for the minister will know that he has hundreds of auditors hanging on to the end of telephone receivers in all parts of the city.
