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NO TRACE OF THE LORANE DESPERADO

Posse Returns Empty Handed After Finding Sanguine Evidences of Terrific Struggle in Cabin Between Him and Fenwick - Outlaw May Have Gone to Smith River

Lorane, April 12.—The crowd that was looking for the Lorane outlaw returned yesterday about 3 o'clock after a thorough but very tiresome search.

Reports differ somewhat, but the men agree now in the belief that the outlaw has a confederate.

Mr. Fenwick has said all along that he believed there were two of the fellows, and since his encounter he is more than ever convinced of it. He says that on account of his dog taking on so during the fight he feared the other was coming to the rescue or he would not have left the cabin without making sure of his antagonist's non-escape.

They say the cabin bears sanguinary evidence of the fierce struggle which took place there. Fenwick's coat has a couple of bullet holes through it, his gun barrel was badly battered and his arms are bruised, yet he was a lucky man, for the bandit would have surely shot him as he left had he not injured his pistol so badly in rattling the gun barrel that it only snapped.

The bandit must have thought Fenwick was still watching the house, else he would not have crept out through the small back window, and it seems rather strange, too, that bleeding profusely as his wound did, all signs of blood should cease after he left the log where he changed shoes for moccasins.

Did Outlaw Shoot Himself?
The folks at home down the river yesterday heard a shot about half-past ten, but the men say that none of them fired a gun till on their way home, near 1 o'clock, and some of them thought they heard a call, once only, in the direction from which the shot is said to have come. So some people wonder if the miserable tramp did not shoot himself, while others think he has gone over into the Smith River country and that as soon as his wound permits he will again appear to harass these parts.

Phones have quieted down and the social atmosphere of this vicinity again registers a normal temperature.
