Work on the new Lare photograph gallery on West Tenth street, back of the commercial club building, is well under way.

A marriage license was issued this morning to Henry Owen, and Miss Bertha Myrtle Ingraham, both of Saginaw.

The household goods of C. Miller arrived here this morning from Portland. Mr. Miller and family will reside near this city.

Chief of Police Farrington picked up a purse containing several dollars this morning. The owner can have it by calling on the chief and describing the property.

The scaffolding on the new Hodes block has been torn away, the building having been entirely completed. It presents a handsome appearance. A cement sidewalk will at once be built in front of it.

The funeral of Mrs. G. J. Travis was held this forenoon with interment in the I. O. O. F. cemetery. It was largely attended by the friends of the family and members of the order to which her son, Attorney L. M. Travis, belongs. Rev. D. E. Lovelidge, rector of St. Mary's Episcopal church, conducted the services.

Judge Frazer, who addresses the assembly of the university Wednesday, is a graduate from the university, class of 1882. That department has been made one of the most important parts of the city government, for it takes the youths who become criminals and trains them for better things.

Frasier vs. the Booth-Kelly Company, wherein the plaintiff seeks to enjoin the defendant from operating its mill race, claiming that the overflow from the race damages his lands. The case has been taken under consideration, and a decision will not be rendered at this time.

The advance man of Norris & Rowe's circus, which will be here on April 26, finally secured the Huddleston grounds, in the southwestern part of the city, on which to pitch the tents. Mrs. Huddleston would not consent to the use of the grounds until the residents in that vicinity consented. Last year they objected to the presence of the circuses there on account of the flies that the animals attracted. They made no serious objection this time, and the contract for the use of the grounds was signed up last evening.

NEWS NOTES FROM COTTAGE GROVE

Vandenburg Chosen City Councilman to Succeed McQueen, Resigned—Miss Maude Blair Will Go To Jamestown.

The Cottage Grove city council met in adjourned regular meeting on Monday night, and at once proceeded to the election of a councilman to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. McQueen. Two candidates were nominated, Mr. Wood by Councilman Comer and Mr. Vandenburg by Councilman Bartels, the latter being elected.

Mayor Jones at this time appointed the various committees as follows: On finance—Bartels, Comer and Porter.

On sewers—Comer, Hubbell and Bartels.

On lights—Venske, Hubbell and Comer.

On streets—Hubbell, Venske and Comer.

On water—Comer, Bartels and Venske.

Fire warden—Porter.

There were three applicants for the position of city marshal, Messrs. Snodgrass, Wallace and Martin. Mr. Snodgrass was elected to succeed himself at a salary of \$60 per month. The same compensation was allowed the night watchman.—Leader.

Miss Blair to Jamestown.

Miss Maude Blair has been selected as one of the young women from Lane county who will go with Colonel Cooper's detachment to the Jamestown fair. The selection is a judicious one and Lane county is fortunate on that team. Miss Blair has already commenced preparations for the trip. Her first work is to intimately acquaint herself with the industries of the county. Another accomplishment which Miss Blair will cultivate is her voice in singing. She

has an unusually full, rich contralto well suited to solo and chorus work. It is understood that it was partly this rare possession that secured her the place in the company.

Lost Piling.

Potts and Lockwood, engaged in cutting and shipping piling, had between \$600 and \$800 worth in Mosby creek before the sudden rise of Saturday last, and were waiting for the spring rise to float them over a riffle just below the boom, but the rise of Saturday gave them more water than they needed and it was so sudden that they were entirely unprepared. The piles got away and are now far on their way to Astoria. Fewer than ten sticks were saved. The loss will prove total unless a few have floated into the low creek bottoms and lodged in the brush.—Western Oregon.

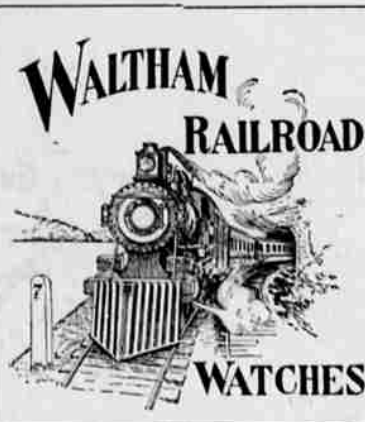
